


NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



Smishing? Phishing? Vishing?

With the ongoing coronavirus (Covid-19) situation, criminals are playing on people's confusion to try new scams. Many claim to offer services and products relating to Covid-19, to trick innocent people into parting with personal information and their money. So here are some tips to help you avoid becoming a victim.

Scams to look out for:

Purchase scams offer protective equipment, sanitising products and other desirable goods for sale that you will never receive. Be careful paying for anything via bank transfer and only buy goods from reputable companies that you know and trust.

Smishing is sending text messages that appear to come from a trustworthy source like the UK government or even your own doctor which try to steal personal or financial information. If you doubt the text's authenticity, don't click links. Visit www.gov.uk to check any information given. Verify an organisation's phone number from their website or from old printed correspondence.

Phishing is sending emails which try to make you divulge sensitive personal or financial information. They may appear to be Covid-19 tax refunds, reimbursements from travel bookings, safety advice via email and even donation requests. Fraudsters will try to make you click on links that aren't safe. So think before you click. If in doubt, then don't click. And don't open any attachments from senders that you don't know. If you're still worried, talk to family, friends or someone else you trust.

Vishing is unsolicited phone calls. Always be suspicious of 'cold-callers'. Don't be afraid to challenge them or hang up if you can't verify the caller. Banks, police etc. will never ask for security information, so never give out personal details. If you're concerned, call the organisation back on the number listed on their website, ideally on a different phone as criminals can sometimes keep the line open. Or if it's your bank, use the number on the back of your card.

What to do if you've been caught out

If you think you've been a victim of fraud or given away more information than you wanted to, contact your Bank, the Police or Action Fraud as soon as possible. It's better to be safe than sorry.

Police are urging vigilance after a number of business burglaries in the county.

During the current situation with the coronavirus outbreak, officers are asking businesses to review their security arrangements. Business owners should consider removing equipment/stock, review CCTV, alarm and lighting provision etc. For more detailed advice do visit https://www.suffolk.police.uk/sites/suffolk/files/coronavirus_small_business.docx.pdf

Wash your hands of coronavirus scams!

Friends Against Scams aims to protect and prevent people from becoming victims of scams.

Be aware of people offering or selling:

- Virus testing kits these are only offered by NHS.
- Vaccines or miracle cures there is currently no vaccine or cure.
- Overpriced or fake goods to protect yourself from coronavirus such as anti-bacterial products.
- Shopping or medication collection services.
- Home decontamination services.

Protect yourself and others:

- Don't be rushed into making a decision. If it sounds too good to be true it probably is.
- Only purchase goods and services from legitimate retailers and take a moment to think before parting with money or personal information.
- Don't assume everyone is genuine. It's okay to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.
- If someone claims to represent a charity, ask them for ID. Be suspicious of requests for money up front. If someone attempts to pressurise you into accepting a service they are unlikely to be genuine. Check with family and friends before accepting offers of help if you are unsure.

Be a good friend, help to protect your family, friends and neighbours from scams.



But let all of us who benefit from deliveries of food and medicine, companionship, transport and countless other kindnesses thank those nameless Stars, by clapping for them every Thursday evening.




RHUBARB & DATE CHUTNEY



WALSHAM-LE-WILLOWS PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

MINUTES of meeting Tuesday 14th April 2020 online via Zoom due to Coronavirus restrictions. Members of the public were able to join the meeting to observe or make representations by registering in advance with the Clerk.

PRESENT Cllrs. Arbon, Bartholomew, Belson, Kinnair, Mecrow & Roberts. Cllr Fleming for the County & Cllr Meyer for the District.

[Pending formal approval at the next meeting, these minutes have been informally approved by Parish Councillors as a true record. If any corrections are required these will be minuted at the next meeting prior to formal approval]

- 1 FIRST BUSINESS
- **1.1** Acceptance of apologies Cllr. Ellis, apologies unanimously accepted.
- **1.2 Minutes of the last meeting** held on 10th March 2020 were unanimously approved. Cllr Roberts to digitally sign pending further advice once face to face meetings can be resumed.
- 1.3 Pecuniary and Non-pecuniary interests of members none declared
- 1.4 Applications for dispensation none
- **1.5 Public Open Forum** No members of the public present
- 1.6 County and District Reports Cllrs Fleming & Meyer presented their respective reports. These included for the County, Consultation on new Orthopaedic Centre in Colchester, School Transport Opt-In, Street Lighting capital investment, Suffolk Walking festival, and Civil Parking Enforcement. And for the District, Mid Suffolk Covid-19 response, detail of changes to Customer Services in light of response to Covid-19. The Clerk enquired as to the capital investment for streetlighting and if this was available for streetlamps owned and maintained by the Parish Council. Clerk to email the inventory to Cllr Fleming who will make enquiries.

Cllr Fleming to advise Clerk of any more report information for the website.

Cllr Mecrow raised the issue of possible restrictions on the lighting of bonfires with Cllr Meyer as these can make things very difficult for anyone with Coronavirus breathing difficulties. Outcome was that the powers do not exist to prevent this which would require temporary emergency changes to law/ regulation. Clerk to place notice in Observer asking people to consider the impacts on their neighbours particularly in the light of the Coronavirus epidemic.





- 4.3 Community Council Cllr Bartholomew reported that the Memorial Hall has been closed due to the Coronavirus outbreak, but this is being used as an opportunity to get decorating and electrical work completed. Also, that the Hall is reasonably secure in terms of long-term viability. 

Play Council/Parish Council governance relationship — update from Cllr Kinnair and the Clerk. No further progress other than for peace of mind the Clerk had asked Clive Wadham-Smith to review the situation and Option II as put to Council and agreed in March. Walsham le Willows Play Council [Charity number 293364] Update on current position from the Parish Council

A fantastic group of volunteers from the village, with the agreement of the Parish Council, has completed valuable work consulting with residents on ideas for the development of the Play Area on Townhouse Road. They also took on the formidable task of removing the skate ramp which had become unsafe. Their excellent volunteer consultation exercise has resulted in a plan of phased development ready to be used for fundraising and then implemented. They continue their work behind the scenes on further consultations, on fundraising from local organisations and on getting the support of the school and sports club for future fundraising efforts. The Parish Council is extremely grateful for this work whilst the legalities of the situation with the governance of the charity were investigated and worked through.

Efforts have been made to get a new Play Council Executive Committee formally established without success. The last AGM of the Play Council was held on 23rd May 2018.

The Parish Council assumed direct responsibility (rather than grant funding the Play Council) for the day to day maintenance of the Play Area in 2018 and, having identified the route to resolving governance and funding issues, recently resolved to take on the development of the Play Area as well.

The Play Council constitution states that assets can only be passed to another 'charitable institution or institutions having objects similar to some or all of the objects of the Play Council but only with the approval of the Charity Commissioners'. Assets include the bank account balance of £7937.75 as at 25th June 2018. This amount covers the first of five planned phases of development. The Parish Council believes that there has been no significant financial activity since then. This balance, as far as we can tell from accounts from 2015-2017, is comprised almost entirely of direct grants from the Parish Council for day to day maintenance.

The Parish Council believes that there are only two other suitable charities in the village who could formally take on the development and maintenance of the Play Area: The Old Town Trust and the Sports Club. Informal approaches by the Parish Council indicate that neither are likely to be willing to take on responsibility for the Play Area. Transfer of the assets to other charities in Suffolk would leave the children of the Parish worse-off and potentially leave a wasting asset (land and play equipment) at Townhouse Road that would need to be dismantled to comply with Health and Safety.

The Parish Council is not, and cannot be, a charity but has the same objective as the Play Council which is to continue to provide opportunities for play to the children of the village. Therefore, consent has been sought from the Charity Commission to change the constitution so that the remaining funds can be transferred and managed by the Parish Council for the benefit of the Play Area and to dissolve the Play Council charity. This will make administration much easier and allow our fantastic volunteers to focus on what they do best which is helping to improve the Play Area with the full support of the Parish Council.

"WHAT, WILL THESE HANDS NE'ER BE CLEAN?"

So says Lady Macbeth in the sleepwalking scene near the end of the Scottish play. As for us, our hands are red raw with all this washing. Shakespeare's murderous lady seeks to escape the consequences of her previous actions. The Jerusalem governor Pontius Pilate in Matthew's gospel washes his hands in public. This is a ritual gesture, like Lady Macbeth's. Ultimately it means that the Romans are not responsible for the death of an innocent person. Pontius Pilate represents Roman law. Dickens readers will remember that the lawyer, Jaggers, in 'Great Expectations' frequently washes his hands. The first description of Jaggers mentions the smell of 'scented soap'. The lawyer is presumably washing away his own guilt together with that of the criminals he has to deal with. Though written in 1860, the novel is set in the early 19th century when people were beginning to understand the dangers of contagion. We must be on our guard. Hand-washing is still the best policy.

FROM ST MARY'S CHURCH

Although our churches are closed at this present time, the Church with a capital 'C' is certainly not. Services are no longer of course taking place in our buildings, but daily they are streamlined by the Diocese and can be found on the 'A Church Near You' website.

Along with this my own personal communication details are posted outside all of the Benefice churches, and I am always available for practical help or merely a listening ear.

Judging by the communications I have received, along with conversations had with other Ordained colleagues, not to mention letters to the Church Times; there is some disquiet and obvious upset that our churches remain closed. As a Priest who 'says' the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer in church, my personal disappointment is immense.

However, our Bishops and Archbishops have not made these decisions lightly, and I fully accept and support their actions. Our church leaders are simply attempting to work alongside other faith leaders and to assist the Government in its work to 'defeat' Coronavirus.

I fully realise that all of this is even more distressing to those who have had to postpone weddings, and those left unsure of when their marriages will take place in the future, certainly in the format they would hope for; I am deeply sorry that I have no answer at the moment. Sadly funerals are not taking place in church, but at the graveside or Crematorium, with restricted numbers. Baptisms, unless emergencies, are also postponed.

Times of crisis traditionally bring out the best in people, and the present troubles have proved to be no exception. We read and hear daily of those who give so much towards their fellow brothers and sisters, for some sadly the ultimate sacrifice. As a Benefice we can all be immensely grateful and proud for all across our Parishes who are acting as 'Good Neighbours' to others within our Communities.

It may well be of little consolation, but this is not the first time our churches have been closed. Eight hundred years ago, when our churches were governed from Rome (The Church of England was yet to be 'invented!'), in a bitter dispute with King John, Pope Innocent III, arguably the most powerful person in Europe at the time, issued an 'Interdict' across England and Wales closing all churches. No one was allowed to attend Mass (Communion), anointing the sick was banned, and whilst burials could take place, no religious ceremony was permitted at the funeral.

By a strange coincidence, which you couldn't make up, the Pope issued his 'Interdict' on the same day as Boris Johnson issued the Lockdown; March 23rd, albeit in the year 1208! We hope that our Lockdown lasts weeks/months, the Popes' 'Interdict' lasted 6 years!!

Finally, I read recently that Christian thinkers are divided as to whether the present crisis will lead to a religious revival, or hasten the demise of organised religion.

Historically, major disasters, such as World Wars, have led to a spiritual revival. Already the amount of people seeking websites relating to prayer and livestream church services are reporting record figures like never before.

As St Paul said all those years ago; 'neither death, nor life, nor things present, nor things to come, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.'

My eldest son works in retail too and we come in to contact with many people. Is my husband happy for me to work so many hours? To be brutally honest - No, he isn't - but he knows I love my work, I love interacting with customers and providing them with some sense of "normality", even if it is for those few minutes they are in the shop.

Sometimes it can be extremely difficult to remain positive with the uncertainty for peoples' futures. However, in the current situation whereby people are losing their lives, their livelihood, their jobs, their income, my worries are insignificant.

When all this is over and a vaccination is readily available to all, my wish for society as a whole is to become far more tolerant with each other and to remember how, in 2020, we all helped our neighbours and friends (old and new) and how this should continue.

And for those who have discovered there is a village shop which has supported you in difficult times, we look forward to continuing to welcome you and long may you support us, in the future.

Finally, please remember in these very uncertain times, when you are out shopping, a little thank you goes a very, very long way.

REMEMBERING JUMBO

Back in the mid-Seventies, when I moved to Walsham, I was still playing cricket for Haughley, but I followed the fortunes of Walsham cricket team in the Bury Free, who at that time published the score details of the local village teams. Two names which cropped up regularly were those of Ian Campbell and John Folkard, who seemed to have the bowling tied up between them.

With the demise of Haughley Cricket Club, whose pitch had been described as 'little better than a cabbage patch' by the Wright Brothers of Wattisfield, and the persuasive talk of Ray Rudderham - at that time a near neighbour - I plucked up the courage to offer my services, as a somewhat wayward bowler, to the Walsham team. Little did I know that John Folkard had had to quit playing cricket as he had damaged his ankle quite badly. So I found myself partnering Mr Campbell in the bowling department. As an astute player he took the slightly downhill run up, leaving me to trundle uphill.

It was shortly after joining the team that I discovered that John's nickname was Jumbo, when I went to see a physio in Bury to whom John had gone to try and get his ankle fixed. She said that she had been somewhat worried about her DIY examination table when the rotund figure of Jumbo had appeared at her clinic. Thankfully a reasonable safety factor must have been built in as no further damage was done to John's body as a result of the visit.

John, for some time, continued his association with the cricket section of the sports club through his ground-keeping skills, which consisted of ensuring that the square was kept neatly trimmed, leaving the rolling to the members of the day's team - pulling an agricultural roller back and forth. In due course, though, the club managed to acquire a heavy mechanical roller.

On one of the first times that it was used, by John on a slightly damp day, he went up and down covering the whole square in double-quick time. Looking back at his handiwork he was surprised to see a very uniform set of parallel lines running across the pitch, until it was pointed out that, even though the roller was quite a bit heaver than he, his standing at one side of the driver's platform would produce a distinct list, thus producing his wonderful orderly pattern.

There have been many other characters who have wielded the willow or leather in years gone by and it is hoped that players past and present might like to record their contributions to the club, either through the pages of the Observer or through the pages of a history of Walsham Sports Club which it is hoped to be produced in the not too distant future.

A TIME FOR INTROSPECTION

After 50 years in Walsham

Well, not quite 50 years as we arrived on 11th December 1970 to find a power cut in place and our first night's sleep in Walsham was started by first blowing out the candles. I had warned Mrs C, having bought Clay Cottage without consulting her, that the water pump on the corner of Clay St was an indication of a different life to that which she was to leave in the south of London but the absence of electricity was possibly an early test of our marriage. Next day the lights were back on and, of course, there was water in the tap; just an example of what I call humour, but she calls something else!

I am starting to write this article as we enter our third week of isolation being at the wrong age range of the 70s and having used the dry weather to sort out most of the garden needs. The editor suggested I might provide some personal background to my time being involved with the Sports Club and having re-read the book by John Hatcher, a factional story of the Black Death in Walsham 1349, it is clearly time to put something on paper for my benefit if not yours as that epidemic arrived to the east of the village and headed past Clay St as it climbed to a peak on Easter Sunday 12th April. The disease successfully wiped out many of the older members of the Parish and much of the knowledge and information that the passing years provide.

In my first season's cricket with the Club, our base was the old pavilion on the western boundary of the ground. It had been in use since the 19th century although now the roof was tiled instead of its original thatch but the interior still features roof supports with original tree trunks and branches. The evolution since those days to what we now have, is a tribute to all the volunteers who have given of their time and sometimes money to provide the village with sporting facilities of which they can be proud.

I headed the article an introspection because I think when Corved 19 has passed through and life can return to normal, it won't necessarily by the 'normal' as we know it now. I had already started thinking about the future for the Club and how long it could continue to be managed by volunteers given the complexity of what is now a small business so given this period of limited activity, a strategic review is called for. I would like to involve members of the wider community beyond Sports Club membership to tap into expertise that I am sure exists as we try to put together a business plan to take the Club forward and secure its role in village life.

In a subsequent edition of the Observer, questions can be asked of what you, the readers, believe should be our way forward; in what ways should we seek to improve what is on offer for the whole community in terms of sport and recreation and how do we manage and maintain the Sports Club. The traditional funding stream from bar takings has flatlined at best and may well shrink so our business model for the future will need fresh thinking.

BANANA LOAF

This is one of my favourite recipes as it's easy to make, always turns out well and is very yummy. This recipe will also make you feel very thrifty and virtuous as it uses bananas that are past their best, that is, of course, if they survive that long in your house at present. In my experience once banana skins have a few brown marks on them children refuse to eat them to cries of 'gross' or 'this banana is yuck!'. The only downside of this recipe is if you don't like bananas!

If you have managed to get hold of some basic baking ingredients, which I know is not that easy at present then simple loaf cakes use less eggs and ingredients than more elaborate cakes with fillings and toppings. So, loaf cakes are what I'm baking at present to make what ingredients I have go further.

This is also a cake that you can bake with your children. Most children love to bake, mostly because there is something to eat at the end of all their hard work. During difficult times when you may be trying to work from home as well as help your children with their online school-work, making time to bake together can be a lovely shared time as well as great fun. Baking is also a wonderful vehicle for a variety of learning opportunities and building life skills such as:

Mathematics: weighing, measuring, timing, counting, estimating

Literacy: reading and understanding recipes, following instructions, ordering actions.

Science: learning about combining ingredients, process changes, chemical reactions such as cakes and bread rising.

Food Technology: exploring new tastes and textures before and after cooking, exploring ingredients in their raw state and finding out about the processes that they go through to get to our tables.

Hygiene and safety: hands- on experience of practising good hygiene and identifying and understanding the need for safety in the kitchen.

All that sneaky learning from baking a simple banana loaf. Amazing!

Recipe for Banana Loaf

Ingredients

- · 175g caster sugar
- · 100g softened butter/margarine
- · 2 large eggs
- · 225g self-raising flour
- · 1 teaspoon of baking powder
- · 2 tablespoons of milk
- · 2 ripe bananas roughly mashed

Method

• Pre-heat your oven to 180C/Fan 160C/Gas 4

- Lightly grease a 2lb loaf tin. Line the bottom only of the tin with greaseproof/baking parchment. This will stop the cake from sticking to the bottom of the tin and make it easier to turn out.
- If you are going to use a food mixer then put all the ingredients into the bowl and whisk well. However, if you are making this cake with children then the hand-baking method is best so that they can see how the mix changes when ingredients are added, also they can get more involved in the process.

Hand-baking Method

- Mix the weighed caster sugar and butter/margarine together and beat until light and fluffy.
- Break the two eggs into a separate bowl and whisk well.
- Weigh out the flour and add the baking powder to the flour, making sure the flour and baking powder are well mixed.
- Gradually beat the eggs, flour and milk into the caster sugar and butter. Beat well until the mixture is smooth.
- Mix in the mashed bananas.
- Pour the mixture into the loaf tin and bake in a preheated oven for one hour (60 minutes).
- You can test if the cake is cooked through by inserting a skewer in the centre. If the skewer comes out clean, then the cake is cooked.
- Leave the cake to cool on a wire rack.

Banana Loaf will keep fresh for up to three or four days if wrapped in foil and stored in an airtight container (that's if it lasts that long!). It also freezes beautifully and is delicious spread with butter.

NETTLE SOUP

Find a patch of nice clean young nettles.

With thick gloves and secateurs cut nettle tops to get a good basketful.

Ingredients

1 basket of nettle tops 1 onion and garlic clove (chopped)

Nob of butter or oil 1 or 2 Stock cubes 1 litre of hot water Salt and pepper Grated nutmeg Single cream

In April and early May, pick young nettle tops.

Melt the butter or oil and add the chopped onion for 6 minutes, add chopped up nettle stalks for 3 to 4 minutes. Cover with hot water and stock cube, boil gently for 20 minutes. Blitz or blend and serve with a dash of cream and grated nutmeg. Nettle quiche is nice too!



ON THE BIKE IN DAYS OF CORVID

Thankfully, in these days of 'lockdown', we are privileged, in this area, to be able to get out to enjoy the fresh air without running into the danger of 'overcrowding' or disobeying the social distancing requirements.

With the request that we leave our houses just once during the day I try to combine a shopping trip with a cycle ride. The challenge is to try and steer clear of centres of villages - if possible - so planning a ride presents just a small challenge.

Last week I set out from Rolfes, with my newspaper, bread and lunchtime food in my panniers and set off in the direction of that 'everlasting' building site - Sunnyside, where I took a right turn and pedalled uphill to the completed building of Bribery and on to 'Reeves' corner. Here, taking a right and left I was on my way to Long Thurlow, via Badwell Green. At Long Thurlow I turned right and, after riding along the village street, took a left-hand turn to take me along the quiet road through Daisy Green. At the next junction I turned left, and headed towards Weatherden Hightown - on the way having the luxury of a downhill swoop, at the bottom of which a right-hander took me past the Elmswell storage warehousing and on to the Elmswell - Ashfield road. A short distance, after passing the water tower I turned left, heading towards Norton and, having passed the entrance to Miles Drainage, took the next right-hand turning and headed towards Hunston, along a narrow, twisting switchback road. At the small duck pond in Hunston I took a left and right to ride with care across the ford and uphill to Langham. Turning right, at the post box and then left, after riding a quiet narrow lane, I found myself at the T-junction on the Ixworth - Walsham road. Then it was just over a mile before I was back in Walsham, having cycled just over fourteen miles. As this is approximately a circular route I was as much wind assisted as wind challenged and the rises either way were almost equivalent.

On other rides that I have been on, during the 'lockdown', I have been able to enjoy riding far more than usual as a result of there being far less motorised traffic on the roads; at times when I have had to cross the A143 I have frequently been able to ride straight across without having to watch long snakes of traffic going past. I have also noticed far more family groups out on their bikes, and horse riders must feel far safer themselves.


Hopefully those people who have found themselves more frequently on two wheels will feel confident enough to use the same form of transport once the movement restrictions have been relaxed.


