Thankfully we are not having to take 'risks' when queuing outside Rolfes since the queues are far shorter, but now with masks. Church services are back - as you will see on page 35 - but no singing!; so we shall have to wait for some time before Songs of Praise makes its return.

There was a good turnout for the Neighbourhood Plan 'exhibition' at Church Farm Barn on Thursday 23rd July; see Page 45. Even if you were unable to attend do make every effort to let the organising group know how you feel about the village and the way that you would like to see it develop. It is only by being able to give a clear picture, to local authorities, about how the community feels that we shall stand a chance of having some degree of 'control'.

As mentioned in last month's Observer a 'virtual' Gardens Weekend is being put together - in view of the fact that the actual event had to be cancelled - and should be available to view by the middle of August for your 'delight' and hopefully for those from further afield who might have been considering venturing to Walsham at the end of the month.

As we are being reminded, the pandemic is far from over and if we want to minimise the risk of there being a second wave we need to be vigilant and behave with due consideration and care towards others. Keep others Safe by keeping yourself Safe as well.





NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH NEWS



At 3.19pm on Sunday 19th June, an intruder was spotted on CCTV within a fenced compound at a building renovation site in Finningham Rd., Walsham le Willows. He is described as a bearded white male, aged in his 30's and made off in a blue panel van with an 02 partial registration taken after he was scared off by a shed alarm which he activated. Nothing was taken but this does show the effectiveness of adequate security arrangements.

High value plant type equipment left unattended is always at risk of theft and thieves are operating in our area. Sometime during Tuesday 30th June and Wednesday 1st July, containers were forced on a site and a large amount of landscaping and tree surgery equipment was stolen. Also a trailer and items of plant.

Containers were also forced at Walsham le Willows Sports Club on Summer Rd and items of gardening equipment have been stolen.

Believed during the evening of Friday 3rd July at the allotments on Wattisfield Road., Walsham le Willows, damage was caused when all the taps on the water butts outside the 23 sheds were opened allowing them to empty. Two chicken coops were opened and the occupants escaped and damage was caused to a poly tunnel. Those allotment holders are understandably upset and any information as to the offenders would be gratefully received.

Nationally reported have been a rise in thefts of dogs, believed prompted by a rise in demand for pets during our lock down travails and the corresponding rise in prices demanded. At a kennels in Barton Mills on 10th July, a total of 17 dogs were stolen including two litters of puppies. It has been locally reported that some householders have noticed markings having been placed outside their property, leading to a fear that they have been identified for subsequent theft. Please be alert to this kind of theft as it is very distressing for the losers of much loved pets.

VILLAGE HALL UPDATE


With the Government announcing the gradual easing of lock down with strict COVID guidelines, the committee have been working together to assess how the village hall can reopen. Following Community Action Suffolk information, a COVID risk assessment has been completed and the coffee shop has opened. It is presently outside in the Ray Freeborn garden (weather permitting) with social distancing on Thursday mornings, 10.30 until 12 noon, to coincide with the Post office van visit.

The up grade of the kitchen continues with new double glazed windows to replace the old single glazed ones and a new back door being installed this week.

For those of you who were unable to access the Observer online a brief update as to the works going on while the hall has been closed. The back log of maintenance has been started on and the Lobby entrance area and the rear extension have both been repainted and made good, 3 panels of double glazing that had blown and were misting up have been replaced, the De-fib has had a service, replacement battery and pads, the first fix of the electrics in the kitchen have been completed.

The committee have also secured a COVID grant that insures the halls finances are secure for the forseeable future.




PRIORY ROOM CLEANSING

I moved to Wattisfield Road with my parents in the summer of 1936 having previously been living in a thatched cottage in the street.

Personally I would have liked the name Granger considered for a road name as Ewart Granger owned the butchers shop at the bottom of the road and also Mill Farm where the new development is taking place.

I can remember the farm and the outbuildings, barn and cattle yard where his beef cattle were reared.

Ewart was also Walsham's representative on Thedwastre Council after WWII before Mid Suffolk District Council took over.

WALSHAM-LE-WILLOWS ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

of meeting Tuesday 14th July 2020 online via Zoom due to Coronavirus restrictions. Members of the public were able to join the meeting to observe or make representations by registering in advance with the Clerk.

PRESENT Cllrs. Bartholomew, Belson, Kinnair, Mecrow & Roberts. Cllr Fleming for the County & Cllr Meyer for the District.

[Pending formal approval at the next meeting, these minutes have been informally approved by Parish Councillors as a true record. If any corrections are required these will be minuted at the next meeting prior to formal approval]

1 FIRST BUSINESS

- 1.1 Apologies Cllr Ellis and Cllr Arbon, accepted.
- 1.2 **Minutes** for the meeting held on 6th June 2020 were unanimously approved.
- 1.3 **To receive pecuniary and non-pecuniary interests of members** Cllr Bartholomew and Cllr Roberts both for 4.3 relating to decision on request for funding.
- 1.4 **To consider applications for dispensation** None granted. Cllrs Bartholomew and Roberts not to take part in discussion or decision apart from questions to be answered by Cllr Bartholomew prior to the decision being taken.
- 1.5 Public Open Forum One member of the public present. Representation received for Parish Council support of request for funding for flooring of Memorial Hall.
- 1.6 **County and District Reports** Cllrs Fleming & Meyer presented their respective reports for questions. These included for the County, Covid-19 outbreak control plan, Suffolk Coronawatch dashboard, Mobile Testing Units, Public Transport, Public Health Services (Covid-19), Schools Opening and Suffolk Recycling Centres. And for the District, Discretionary Business Grants, MSDC Study into Green Opportunities, BMSDC Blueprint for a Sustainable Future, Creating a Safer Suffolk, CIFCO Business Plan, and the Re-Opening of Halls and Community buildings. 
Cllr Meyer noted that the marking that have appeared on the road are something to do with the water authority.

Cllr Bartholomew asked for a contact at Mid-Suffolk re Discretionary Business Grants for our early years provider. Action Cllr Meyer to get back.

Cllr Meyer also took the opportunity to address press reports ostensibly showing

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Suffolk care homes comparing unfavourably with Norfolk care homes in regard to Covid deaths but which on analysis of the data shows that the Suffolk figures are impacted by an earlier introduction (by two weeks) of testing in as well as having a greater number of end of life care beds meaning the figures need to be adjusted to give a true comparison.

Cllr Meyer also noted a statistic with regard to Covid deaths per 100,000 of the population on Suffolk (0.9) and Leicester (141) meaning we are very lucky to be living in an area that has so far been far less affected, not that this is a cause for complacency with regard to preventative measures to keep it that way.

Cllr Fleming joined the meeting [19:38] after agenda item 3, Planning Outcomes, and invited questions on her report

Cllr Mecrow asked about the reopening of recycling centres. Cllr Fleming advised that they were open with booking system still in place for the time being and which will probably continue until restrictions are lifted.

Cllr Roberts asked Cllrs Fleming and Meyer about solutions to fly-tipping problems both inside Walsham and just outside. Cllr Fleming advised that any fly -tipping reported to Highways would be dealt with. Action Cllrs to send locations to Clerk who will report to Highways.

APPLICATION FOR PLANNING PERMISSION - DC/20/02824 Proposal: Planning Application. Erection of a new dwelling Location: Land Rear Of Avenue House, The Street, Walsham Le Willows, Bury St Edmunds Suffolk IP31 3AZ The Parish Council Objected To This Application with the following comments:

We would like to lodge our objections to this application in the strongest terms possible. Our mains points of objection are:

(1) This site is in the Walsham le Willows Conservation Area. In Walsham, the Conservation Area consists mainly of the old heart of the village, along The Street, and an extensive area of parkland created around The Grove, (early 19th cent. Mansion). This site is at the only real meeting point of these two key elements and so any development here would have a particularly detrimental effect on the appearance and cohesion of the Area.

(2) The plot is within a designated Special Landscape Area. This section of the SLA consists basically of parkland with an impressive avenue of mature lime trees leading up to The Grove. Villagers have enjoyed use of The Avenue for many years and because it is immediately accessible from The Street it is the section of the SLA which provides the highest amenity value. Development of this site would severely detract from the atmosphere of the avenue and the character of this much used section of the SLA.

(3) The plot is now outside the village Settlement Boundary. It would be extremely difficult to justify allowing development of this site for a single residential unit which is intrusive, inappropriate and unnecessary.

(4) The plot has always been within the curtilage of a 17th. cent thatched house, (No. 1 Avenue Cottage), set in a 14th. cent. messuage. It, and its immediate neighbour, (cottage No. 2), were identified as buildings of Special Historic and Architectural Interest by Mrs. Sylvia Colman in her survey of 1967. The buildings are not listed because of the rather dramatic modifications which occurred when The Avenue was created in c.1860, but from a local point of view this adds to their historic value and interest. To build a modern house on this site would be an affront to our heritage and would seriously detract from the impact of the two cottages.

(5) The proposed design is totally inappropriate for this very sensitive location. Both the design and the materials involved would clash quite violently with the period atmosphere and the neighbouring buildings: two 17th. cent. Timber framed thatched cottages and an early 18th. cent. Brick house, (Avenue House).

We are additionally concerned that the site has flooded in the past when both Avenue Cottages and their gardens were inundated with floodwater from the

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stream. Access from the site onto The Street is also at a particularly difficult and rather dangerous part of the road.

Finally, concern has been expressed about the bridge which crosses the stream and gives access to The Avenue and the proposed site. The simple, ornamental bridge dates from the creation of The Avenue; it is privately owned and has probably never been weight tested or assessed; it is not at all certain that it would cope with heavy construction traffic. If the bridge was damaged or destroyed it is quite possible that villagers would find their use of The Avenue, which is not a public right of way, was either lost or seriously impeded.

We ask that this application be rejected.



4 MATTERS ARISING

- 4.1 **Development & Neighbourhood Plan** Cllr Belson reported on the preparations for the drop-in day on housing on 23rd July in Church Farm Barn. Looking like it should be an interesting 'exhibition' to stimulate discussion on possible sites to put forward for development.
- 4.2 **Streetlighting conversion update** Clerk updated on new information which puts the quotes received into a different light as when the additional work required from SCC even if using a 3rd party is added in, the quotes are not very different. The Clerk suggested that on this basis the Parish Council might be better to stick with SCC as at least this is only two parties involved rather than three. And hopefully SCC has another contractor in place to be able to expedite the work more quickly on lanterns in the vicinity of overhead power cables. Based on the information supplied by the Clerk Councillors unanimously agreed to change their previous decision to instruct Pearce & Kemp to an instruction to SCC providing that there was now no contractual obligation with Pearce & Kemp. Action Clerk to confirm contractual position with Pearce & Kemp.

Bartholomew reported that work continues on the MH for re-opening, but this won't be until September at the earliest. Covid-19 guidelines on compliance for opening are updated daily and it adds to the delay. The coffee shop did serve drinks to people outside and this was well received but it is weather dependent. It is hoped that the next Observer may be published in print as well as on-line, but the printed publication is dependent on progress with making the Widows Room The PCC have indicated this work is in progress. Covid-Secure. Cllr Bartholomew was asked to speak to the previously circulated request for funding the Memorial Hall charity for the upgrade of the kitchen flooring and was asked some searching questions by Councillors. Cllr Bartholomew and Roberts remained "in the room" but then did not take part in deliberations between remaining Councillors about the decision. There was a frank discussion led by Cllr Mecrow on the budget positions of the Parish Council and the Memorial Hall charity. Reservations were expressed about the fact that it had not yet been possible to hold the AGM to publicly present the financial position of the Memorial Hall Charity given the obvious links to the Community Council charity. After much debate Cllr Kinnair proposed the Parish Council agree to pay £2358 for the flooring as this is to maintain village assets. Seconded by Cllr Mecrow and carried unanimously being supported by Cllr Belson also.

- 4.4 **Parking Finningham Road blind bend update Cllrs Bartholomew & Ellis** Cllr Bartholomew had nothing to report. Action Cllr Bartholomew to contact Andrew Long to see if the housing association is now able to proceed following the ease of lockdown.
- 4.5 **Street Cleaning** statement of particulars (contract) pending
- 4.6 **Parish Council Risk Assessment** pending
- 4.7 **Overgrown hedges on The Causeway** It was noted that the hedge had been well cut back leaving more room on the pavement apart from the debris that has accumulated over time underneath the hedge. Action Clerk to contact SCC highways to ask if they can arrange to clear this and to write a thank you letter to the owner of the hedge.

At this point the Clerk had technical problems and was absent from the meeting.

- 4.8 Churchyard Wall repairs it was noted that these have been completed
- 4.9 **Fishponds Lane Footpath** Fishponds Lane Following two recent incidences of fly tipping the option of placing a barrier at the Summer Road end was discussed. The idea being to reduce vehicle access to the footpath. The Parish council agreed to explore the ownership of the lane to determine whether it has the authority to progress such works. Action Cllrs Roberts & Mecrow to investigate.

5 CORRESPONDENCE

5.1 Email re traffic speed – this was discussed at length and it was resolved as follows: Action Clerk Contact Cllr Fleming (who previously had to leave the



meeting) in the first instance to make her aware of the reasons that a SID was not located on that stretch of the Finningham Road therefore no SID data is available to support a request for SCC speed survey; to ask about the possibility of a SCC speed survey nonetheless; to advise that at the very least we need more regular cutting back of hedge growth that obscures road signage as well as consideration to the re-siting of existing and the installation of more. And to seek her guidance on how best to proceed given that she had also received the complaint from Walsham residents.

- 5.2 **Code of Conduct Consultation** -The Parish Council did not wish to make any comment
- 5.3 Email re bench seat outside Rolfes this was discussed, and it was decided to remove the existing bench. Action Cllrs Mecrow & Roberts
- 5.4 Email Street Names for Wattisfield Road Clerk advised the rejection of The Seyke. The other suggestion of Pyes Close was accepted. It was decided to resubmit The Seeke as a known alternative spelling of The Seyke and following the receipt of representation from a village resident, the Parish Council decided to propose a name based on the name of Ewart Granger who owned the butchers shop at the bottom of the road and also Mill Farm where the new development is taking place. Ewart was also Walsham's representative on Thedwastre Council after WWII before Mid Suffolk District Council took over. In addition, names based on trees were put forward, Ash, Hornbeam and Maple. Action Clerk

- **6.1.1 Problem Reports SCC** update Clerk advised that SCC had reported they could not find the sign in question. Action Clerk to check the signage on Palmer Street near Staples Close before reporting this again.
- **6.1.2 Audit** The Clerk reported that the external auditors have acknowledged receipt of documents.
- **6.1.3 Exercise of Public Rights (period when accounts can be inspected)** the Clerk advised that the external auditor will be advised that these will run for 30 working days from 1st July
- **6.1.4 Website** Cllr Bartholomew explained the history of the creation of the website with the Community Council eventually registering as the domain name owner and this being the current position. Cllr Bartholomew proposed that as the Parish Council is required to have a website on which to post relevant information and the Parish Clerk actually manages the rest of the content on the website on a voluntary basis, that is made sense for the domain name to be transferred to the name of the Parish Council to make administration more streamlined. This was seconded by Cllr Roberts and agreed unanimously. Action Clerk to advise Cllr Bartholomew what needs to be done to effect the transfer and add the website to the Parish Council asset register.
- **6.1.5 Document retention** The Clerk proposed the destruction of documents as listed in email circulated on 15/06/2020 and in accordance with NALC guidelines. This was unanimously approved.

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
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lease and a considerable amount of free advice/guidance other than that on relevant charity law. There was a lengthy discussion about the position with current lease and the winding up of the Play Council charity. The conclusion was that, at the appropriate time, the Parish Council will require a renewed lease from the OTT to be able to progress with bids for funding. Without this the development of the Play Area will be in abeyance. Action Clerk to communicate this to the OTT and suggest that they take advice from their solicitors.

- The Clerk reported that an initial informal meeting with Ian Campbell as representative of the OTT agreed a way forward and that there was a mutual interest in ensuring the Play Area provision continues.
- No transfer of balance evident from Santander but the Clerk is unable to handle this directly the mandates still reside with ex-committee members from long ago. Action Clerk to chase the bank signatories to ask them to put pressure on Santander for a resolution.
- Financial report to year end 2018 has been prepared and we await the final bank statement on closure of the account and transfer of the balance from Santander.
- **Play Area– consider re-opening** This was discussed. We are advised that a Covid-19 risk assessment is required for the reopening of the Play Area. Given that throughout the lockdown there has never been any way of definitely preventing access to the Play Area the outcome of any risk assessment will amount to renewed signage advising people to be aware of the risks and to take precautions. ACTION Clerk contact Insurance company to agree way forward.

Development Proposals – The Clerk asked for clarification and Cllr Kinnair advised that the proposed development plan does cover all the requests put forward in the consultation.

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

CECILY'S POSTCARD

Cecily had often wondered how her Grandfather Arthur Fenner, a carpenter of Sydenham, could afford to send his daughter Rosa, Cecily's Mother, to college for two years in the early 1900s to learn Book Keeping at a cost of three pounds, five shillings and six pence per term. When she qualified, Rosa took over the management of the accounts for a Dairyman in Lewisham, also South East London.

Rosa had a friend Maud who died in 1951, since when Cecily had been trying to remember Maud's maiden and married names. One clue was an early 20th century postcard view of Walsham Mill, many decades before the building of houses in Mill Close or Post Mill Gardens. Add to that the fact that when Rosa married Alfred Smith in 1917, his address was given as Walsham Mill. So, how did this unlikely connection between the Fenners of Sydenham and the Smiths of Walsham come about and, more importantly, where does the family friend Maud fit into the picture?

Records show that Maud also married a Walsham man in 1910. His name was Ernest Flatman and Maud's maiden name was Grainger. At the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries, members of the Grainger family were living in Nelson Cottage in Wattisfield Road, Plantation Cottage in Palmer Street, Avenue Cottage in The Street and 7 Noel Terrace in Forest Hill, London. Maud Grainger's parents, George and Ann Grainger, lived in one of The Avenue Cottages in The Street as George was coachman to the family living at The Grove. Maud was the youngest of their eight children and was born in 1884. An older brother, Joseph, appears in the census of 1901 living as an apprentice wheelwright with the Fenner family in Sydenham. Joseph returned to Walsham in 1905 to marry Isobella who ran a tobacconist and confectionary shop in Avenue House on the corner of The Street and The Avenue.

Cecily, now aged 95, realized that Arthur Fenner's ability to pay for those college fees to aid Rosa's further education, was to 'take in paying lodgers', namely Joseph Grainger of Walsham. This led to a lifelong friendship between Cecily's mother and Joseph's sister Maud. An exchange of correspondence and visits between London and Walsham resulted at some point in that early 20th century view of The Mill which was used very recently in Church Farm Barn in a display showing changes in the village over time as part of the Neighbourhood Plan Housing Consultation.

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

THOMAS CLARKSON English Abolitionist

In the aftermath of the shocking death of George Floyd, at police hands in Minneapolis USA, there have been calls across our own nation for the removal of certain statues and memorials to those associated with the slave trade.

One statue with a connection to such a time in our history, which is not under question, is the memorial to Thomas Clarkson, standing proudly in the Cambridgeshire market town of Wisbech.

Thomas was born in 1760 at Wisbech, the eldest son to the local Priest and Master of Wisbech Grammar School, which Thomas attended before entering St John's College Cambridge.

Thomas was a devout Christian and Ordained as a Deacon, but never proceeded to Priest's Orders. Instead, having entered a University essay competition; 'is it lawful to make slaves of others against their will?' life was to take a different direction for him, slavery and the slave trade, as he was to become arguably the most influential of all the abolitionists.

At risk to his own life, assassins were paid to kill him, he travelled throughout the country collecting information on the horrors of slavery, lecturing in towns and cities, and meeting like-minded abolitionists. In the early days he covered over 35,000 miles, all on horseback. By 1794 he was too exhausted to carry on and settled for a while at Bury St Edmunds.

In 1804 Thomas was to begin all over again, travelling the length and breadth of the country. Finally, in 1807, with the support of William Wilberforce, Member of Parliament, the Slave Trade Act was passed, ending the trade and providing British Naval support to enforce it.

The rest of his years were spent in campaigning for the abolition of slavery across Europe, the Caribbean and the outlying Colonies. Again he was to travel tens of thousands of miles upon horseback.

Thomas had settled at Playford near Ipswich in 1816, dying there in 1846, and subsequently buried in the village churchyard of St Mary's.

The Worldwide Church commemorates the abolitionists; Thomas Clarkson, William Wilberforce and Olaudah Equiano, every year on the 30th July. Although so often a very poignant occasion, it was always with a feeling of humility and privilege that, when as the Priest at Playford church, I held the annual memorial service to Thomas Clarkson. A diverse congregation would always pay tribute to his memory.





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NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN HOUSING DAY

A huge thank you to everyone who contributed and visited the Housing Day for the Local Neighbourhood Plan on Thursday 23rd July. Further to the Housing Discussion paper that was circulated throughout the Parish, the Housing Day was designed to identify where we do and don't want any future development. The conversations were incredibly constructive and specific information and comments were recorded to support the development of the Neighbourhood Plan document.

The event included an informative and illustrative exhibition of maps and photos around the walls of the Church Barn that put the core questions around the type of housing we do and don't want in context. Thanks to Richard Belson we had maps showing the Conservation Area, the Special Area of Interest that has been classified by the District Council in the West of Walsham le Willows and details of the flooding areas. Alison Martin created maps and explaining the archaeology of Stone Age, Romano British and medieval settlements evidence alongside a great summary of historical development since the mid 19th century. Maggie Barber compiled a fabulous series of photos showing the story of the progression of the design and style of village architecture. The History Group also joined with a stall of their publications.

The next stage is for the Neighbourhood Plan group to draft housing policies that reflect the needs and thoughts of the village for our Neighbourhood plan and then share those for editing and comment within the community.

This is the first in a series of 'Walsham Conversations' designed to consult the Parish and on issues such as transport, the environment, work, leisure and education. On September 10th volunteers will present the day's findings back to the Community in a step closer towards formulating A Walsham Neighbourhood Plan. 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
'NOTHING THAT IS SO, IS SO.' (Twelfth Night 4.1.7)

Back in the time of the first Elizabeth, the play 'Twelfth Night' was written for the Christmas season. It was performed on January 6th, the festival on the twelfth night after December 25th. People liked the play, so it was scheduled for repeats, like Morecambe and Wise Christmas shows now. But you couldn't call it 'Twelfth Night' in the summer season. Playwright Will wasn't keen on labels. He had already launched one effort with a Do-It-Yourself title. It was called 'As You Like It', and people did like it. Now the public wanted his Christmas 'Twelfth Night' number to re-run in summer with a new title. 'Oh call it whatever you want', he had said exasperatedly.

The play entered the charts as 'Twelfe-Night or what you will' (17th century spelling, with the writer's name snuck in at the end). The plot was about mistaken identity with a couple of twins. Will was the father of twins himself, and had written a comedy about twins a few years before. He called that first play 'The Comedy of Errors', with, believe it or not, two sets of twins. It's a piece of fun which can be presented successfully with young people, as a member of our community has done in recent years. Everything goes haywire in both plays, reflecting uncertain times. Around 1600 the health of the nation was subject to contagious theatre-closing epidemics. It was rather familiar, when 'nothing that is so, is so'.

The staff of a secondary school in South Wales felt that, in their free time, pupils were spending far too much time on activities such as surfing the internet, watching television and playing video games. The acrostic stands for: Drop Everything and Read. That was certainly a good habit for those young people to learn early in life and the school in question found it to be very effective, bringing about a significant change in the study habits of the children.

What great benefits you would find in your life if you obeyed the New Testament when it says: "Give attendance to reading" (1 Timothy 4:13). Let us never lose sight of the great blessing it is to have a copy of the Scripture in our own language and if we really do value it then, at least once every day, we will drop all the things of this world and take time to read the Scriptures. The New Testament tells of the Christians in Berea who: "Searched the Scriptures daily" (Acts 17:11); every day they read the Scriptures and that is a good example to follow. It doesn't matter who you are or what your background is, it is vitally important that you read the Bible daily because it is in the Bible alone that you will find the good news of the Gospel of how to be saved from your sin and how to get to Heaven.



Cricket is very much a game of momentum and firm foundations, so a slow, but uneventful opening stand of 36 between skipper, Liam Bryant and Oli Jackson was just what the side needed. Stowupland switch to spin to break the partnership and were rewarded when Bryant, looking to force the pace, was bowled by the off spinner. The loss seemed to catalyse Jackson, who started to shift through the gears efficiently.

Ashley Forbes joined in the party with some lusty-hitting from the young butcher, before perishing in the deep, but Jackson continued to romp, depositing the Stowupland attack into both the Clubhouse and the neighbouring field in a run-a-ball hundred. Jackson eventually carried his bat for the innings, leaving undefeated on 157 not out, with a challenging total of 225 posted in the 40 overs.

Both sides retired for their solitary teas – no communal tea urns allowed under government guidance. The skies had darkened, and there seemed little chance of completing the game. Nonetheless, the Walsham attack, led by Forbes bowling up the hill, did damage early. Forbes took early wickets nipping the ball in off the seam, accounting for the opposition's top order – Bryant taking a sharp chance at second slip, one nicking to the keeper, French, and the third seeing his off-stump pegged back from an in-ducker.

Stowupland were in dire straits at 45-5 when the heavens opened, and with the covers in place – there was no chance of resumption. Jackson and Forbes will feel aggrieved that their form with bat and ball respectively had not seen a victory – but it will give the side hope heading into the next fixture away to Battisford on the 1^{st} August.

Sunday revealed a glorious day, and a friendly match against local side Risby did end in the deserved victory for Walsham. Sunday cricket is very much about the spirit of the game and getting families involved. Father and son, Richard and Jono Boucher, Suffolk Girls cricketer Sylvie Melvin and new member James Gray all contributed to a wonderful 57 run victory. In another match where a stand out performance with the bat was the difference between the sides, and elegant 91 runs from Adam Howe saw Walsham outclass the Risby side.






