NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH NEWS



Police are appealing for witnesses following a burglary in Rickinghall.

The incident occurred between 3pm and 4pm on Thursday 13 May at an address in Rectory Hill.

An occupant of the house was upstairs when they heard somebody downstairs. On calling out to see who it was, the person then ran off. Nothing was stolen during the incident.

Vigilance urged with metal theft

Police are advising farmers, churches and relevant businesses to stay vigilant to the issue of metal theft.

The call comes as copper prices increase and is driven by the combination of surging demand and a global copper deficit. The increase in the price of copper is also driven by an increase in demand due to the recovery of the economy post Covid, particularly as the construction industry gets back on its feet once again.

Businesses are also advised of the value of copper in cabling and associated thefts where multiple cable drums or large amounts of cable are stolen at a time. Although Suffolk, as a county, has not seen an increase in such thefts in recent weeks, businesses, farmers, churches and landowners are all advised to ensure they take necessary precautions to combat the potential for thieves to exploit the situation.



As hoped the Memorial Village Hall was able to open its doors again to the village on the 17th of May and now has a variety of classes taking place most days of the week.

Coffee shop on a Thursday morning sees the return of the book swap / exchange, an easy free way to swap the books you no longer need with those you want to read. Diana has returned with Flamingo cards, gift wrap and craft kits and Sharon will have her Tropics skin care and makeup available too.

With the hall back in use, the Community Council would like to remind people that the car park is primarily for those using the hall and the bowling club. We understand that with limited parking in the high street some residents use the car park and while we as a committee acknowledge this fact, we ask that those residents using this facility to be mindful of the needs of the patrons of the hall and bowling green. It is in fact a private car park. If you are not a patron of the hall or the Bowling club please could you make a donation in the white tube by the gate, which will go towards the car park upkeep.

Maintenance of the car park is solely the responsibility of the charity and not the Parish Council or Suffolk County Council Highways. We have recently been advised that the charity should be setting aside/ ring-fencing at least $\pounds1,000$ a year towards future repairs. Please also be aware that on occasion you may be asked to park elsewhere if the hall has a particular booking that requires all of the car park.

As controlled indoor events can now take place the Community Council will be holding their A.G.M. on June the 25th, in line with any COVID restrictions that may be in place. The community Lunch is hoping to make its long awaited return on the second Monday of July, so look out for more information in the next Observer.

We are also planning to hold a village Garage Sale Trail on Sunday the 1st of August, so you can sell items from the comfort of your own garden/drive and make some money from the clear out you've had over lockdown. WI members from Walsham joined two video link sessions on 29th April to hear speakers from Ovarian Cancer Action and "Ovacome" describe just what symptoms should alert women for early diagnosis. Also joining the session was Sue from Bexley Heath, who movingly described her personal experiences and on- going battle against this deadly disease. Walsham members will be deciding how their delegate should vote at the on-line NFWI Annual Meeting when they meet at the Garden Meeting, to be held at Maltings, Palmer Street on 9th June. Hopefully a face to face meeting at last!

Still active is the "Make a Match" campaign to increase UK stem cell registry in order to provide potentially life- saving treatment for blood cancers. All Suffolk West Federation members, including those of Walsham le Willows and District, are urged to join a free video talk on Friday 29th May 2.30pm (Contact WI Office 01284 336645 for link) Speakers from DKMS and Anthony Nolan and also a WI member with personal experience, who will explain more about donation and will debunk some of the myths surrounding the process.


Events for 2021

- Sunday the 31st of October between 4pm and 7pm there will be a Halloween Pumpkin event in the woodbring your own pumpkin and more details to follow

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
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EASTERN ANGLES


Admission is £4.00 payable on the evening. All are welcome, you do not have to be a member of the History Group to attend the talk.





PARISH COUNCIL OF WALSHAM LE WILLOWS MINUTES

of the meeting held on Tuesday 26th May 2021 commencing at 7.00 p.m. in the Memorial Hall.

[Pending formal approval at the next meeting, these minutes have been informally approved by Parish Councillors as a true record. If any further corrections are required these will be minuted at the next meeting prior to formal approval]

MEMBERS PRESENT Cllrs Paul Arbon (PA); Ian Bartholomew (IB); Richard Belson (RB); Brian Kinnair (BK); Nick Mecrow (NM); Trevor Roberts (TR)

NON MEMBERS PRESENT Cllrs Jessica Fleming [County] and Rick Meyer [District]

1 FIRST BUSINESS

1.1/1.2 Election of Chairman and appointment of Vice Chair – Cllr Roberts [Chair] proposed Cllr Belson for Chairman, this was seconded by Cllr Mecrow, and unanimously agreed. Cllr Belson was duly elected to the Chair and signed the **Acceptance of Office** (countersigned by the Clerk) before proceeding to thank Cllr Roberts for his period as Chairman.

Cllr Belson sought a nomination for a Vice Chair; Cllr Kinnair proposed Cllr Bartholomew which was seconded by Cllr Roberts and unanimously agreed. Cllr Bartholomew was duly appointed at Vice Chair.

- **1.3** Acceptance of apologies Amanda Ellis sent apologies with her resignation on 13th May 2021. The Parish Council extended thanks to Amanda for her work as Parish Councillor and wished her well for the future. The Clerk confirmed that notice from MSDC electoral team had been obtained and was in hand, publication to coincide with the publication of the June Observer.
- 1.4 Minutes of the last Annual Meeting of the Parish Council held on 12th May 2020 were unanimously approved as true and accurate record. The Clerk advised that the auditor had noted that these should be approved at the next monthly meeting of the Parish Council rather than the next annual meeting.
- **1.5** Minutes of the meeting held on 13th April 2021 were unanimously approved as true and accurate record.
- **1.6** To receive pecuniary and non-pecuniary interests None declared.
- **1.7** To consider applications for dispensation None requested.
- **2 PUBLIC OPEN FORUM** including County and District Reports and Questions [Members of the public are invited to speak at the discretion of the Chair and each representation should take no more than 3-5 minutes. Matters arising can be

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
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referred to a committee, placed on the agenda of the next meeting, responded to by the Clerk or simply noted Councillors. This is to ensure that no discussion takes place for any matter for which there has been no prior notice on the agenda.]

No members of the public present. Cllr Belson invited questions for Cllr Meyer on his report, circulated just before the meeting. There were none on this occasion.

Cllr Fleming advised that she had been returned as County Councillor to represent the Parish; congratulations were offered. Cllr Fleming advised that the annual meeting of the County Council would take place on 27th May and that a report would be submitted for the next meeting. Cllr Fleming advised that some changes to cabinets were to be implemented, one specific to highways flooding and drainage which she hoped would start to better address some of the concerns of parishioners around these issues.

The Clerk asked about the agenda items requiring responses from County Council/Highways that had been 'parked' during the lockdown. Cllr Fleming was hopeful that these could soon be addressed as the changes to cabinets were bedded in.

Cllr Bartholomew raised the issue of an incident at the Finningham Road bend on entry to the village, where he reported narrowly avoiding a head on impact with a motorbike speeding (estimated at more than 60mph), which was quickly followed by three others on the wrong side of the road at the same time as there were other parishioners walking along the highway to footpaths. Cllr Arbon also added his concerns about the speed of vehicles that he has observed along the Elmside development. Both Councillors warned of the potential for a fatality at some point. The Clerk referred to the results of the recent traffic analysis which unfortunately did not appear to provide much support for the view that speeding through the village is a big problem. Cllr Belson brought this discussion to a close asking the Clerk to re-circulate the traffic survey results and all Cllrs to review for discussion at the next meeting on 9th June 2021.

Cllr Arbon raised again with Cllr Fleming the issue of twin-axle trailers still being turned away from the recycling centre with resultants potential impacts on fly-tipping. Cllr Fleming advised she would again follow this up and would insist that the information on the county council website (recycling page) is corrected.

3 ANNUAL BUSINESS

3.1 Adequacy of Insurance cover (employment, public liability & fidelity guarantee) – this was confirmed by internal control check in meeting on 9th March 2021 agenda item 7.2 since when which it was resolved there have been no material changes - noted as **re-confirmed**.





- **3.2** Adoption Financial Regulations 2019 (as amended & circulated) had been reviewed and were proposed for adoption which was unanimously agreed.
- **3.3 Standing orders 2018** Were proposed for readoption with no changes which was unanimously agreed.
- **3.4** Review of Policies and risk assessments it was noted that the Clerk will review these as per audit recommendations for adoption at later date.
- **3.5** Appointment of Internal Auditor 2021/22 It was resolved to re-appoint SALC at the meeting held on 9th March agenda item 7.3 noted and unanimously agreed.
- **3.6** Annual Subscriptions to other bodies –as per previously circulated list for 2021/22 (total well within the s.137 capped limit which is over £8000 pa). Resolved unanimously to continue with donations as per the schedule from last year. All but those to CAB Bury St Edmunds and Stowmarket which are approved under the general power, are approved under s.137 powers.
- **3.7** Asset Register this was reviewed and unanimously approved as an accurate record of Parish Council Assets (with the note from Clerk, and agreement of Council, that a small amount for horse riding signage needs to be added as per invoiced cost).
- **3.8** Suffolk Local Code of Conduct (June 2014) this was unanimously approved for adoption by the Council to comply with audit recommendations.
- **3.9 Dates for meetings for year to 2021/22** The Clerk advised that the Memorial Hall had been booked 9th June 14th July 11th August meetings pending decisions on future venue as we come out of lockdown. Two contacts had been made with the school about meeting there so that meetings can go back to a Tuesday evening, but the Clerk has heard nothing back. Cllr Mecrow offered to nudge this. This makes the list of dates provided for the year partly provisional as the availability depends on the venue. The position was noted. The Clerk will publish dates as they become available and as decision on future venue evolves.
- **3.10 Internal Control Checks policy** The Clerk had reviewed and noted that auditor's recommendation was to remove any that could not be completed in a financial year leaving a suite that would always be completed by financial year end. The Clerk proposed asserting that most are already covered by monthly, quarterly or annual processes in place (as circulated) and Council decide on removal on the others. Cllrs did not feel they were in a position to make this decision, so Cllr Belson requested that Cllr Bartholomew review and put proposal to next meeting.

- **6.2** Internal Audit Report Proposals to address recommendations (previously circulated) must be agreed and approved by the Council. - 6.3 Balances as at 30th April 2021 The Clerk had raised the issue of transferring balances to deposit account but given the fact that no interest is paid and alternative accounts are paying so little, it was agreed that no transfers would be made.
- **6.4** Earmarked/ringfenced funds The Clerk proposed that these are reviewed and updated in the light of funds already received and known upcoming income and planned expenditures. It was proposed that a separate informal meeting should be held for this by Zoom. Clerk to set up Zoom meeting on June 1st at 7.30pm.
- 6.5 Year-end financial statement (previously circulated) was re-presented with changes to reserve position as advised by the internal auditor and was approved and signed by Cllr Belson as Chair.
- 6.6 AGAR Section 1 financial statements made by the council to the auditor (previously circulated) was re-presented reviewed, approved and signed by Cllr Belson as Chair and the Clerk.
- 6.7 AGAR Section 2 annual statement (previously circulated) was reviewed, approved and signed by Cllr Belson as Chair and the Clerk.
- 6.8 Problem Reports SCC Clerk advised no issues of note. Cllr Mecrow asked that the report of 30mph and playground signage on Sumner Road be chased as this has still not been rectified. 7 **MATTERS ARISING** [from previous meeting only where further decisions are required]

7.1 Reducing Meeting Length –The proposal to address this issue put forward as a policy (as amended and previously circulated) by the Clerk was unanimously approved with some reservations noted by Cllr Mecrow who asked about AOB items and Cllr Belson who asked about 'non-financial decisions' under AOB. The Clerk advised advice would be sought to clarify which will be circulated when received. For review in September meeting.

7.2 Play Area Development

- Cllr Kinnair has previously circulated the Sub-Committee report on progress toward narrowing down options to one fully costed plan for use as a specification to obtain further quotes. He asked for agreement on the circulated proposal. Cllr Bartholomew advised that a bid for additional funding could be submitted based on quotes, prior to any tendering process which based on the estimated contract value, should be minimal. Cllr Bartholomew clarified the process is Specification > Quotes > Funding > Tender Process. Cllr Kinnair asked for clarification as to the amount of funding the Parish Council would furnish. The Clerk clarified that the current reconciliation shows amounts for Play Area as £6k (earmarked) and There are an estimated £2k of solicitors' fees re the new £8k (ring-fenced). lease to be paid. The Parish Council unanimously agreed to commit and additional £15k (Neighbourhood CIL) for earmarking to the Play Are development, making a total available for the development of £27k and a shortfall on the total estimated costs (£44k) of 17K. Cllr Bartholomew proposed that an application is submitted to MSDC for £20 to allow for contingencies. Cllr Kinnair to put this into motion. Cllr Meyer noted the issue of a budget for maintenance.
- **II.** Lease The Clerk advised that the Old Town Trust are now just waiting for the decision from the Charity Commission on the agreement to the 'disposal of assets' which the lease represents. This should be no problem as the previous lease was granted in the same way. The Clerk asked that the Parish Council resolve that the final lease (as previously circulated) is agreed for signing as a legal deed, at the appropriate time, by two councillors with the Clerk as witness. This was proposed by Cllr Roberts and seconded by Cllr Kinnair and unanimously agreed.

7.3 Neighbourhood Plan (NP)

i. It was noted that Cllr Belson briefed the last NP group meeting on an outline proposal to seek initial costings for engaging a third party to <u>act as a mentor</u> to guide the NP group through the process of evidence gathering and the writing up of a plan <u>by the group</u>, that could be submitted for adoption. Cllr Belson reports this was welcomed by the NP group and it was proposed and unanimously agreed that the PC formally adopts this process.

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- **ii. Proposals from NP consultants** Proposals from four consultants were circulated previously. These were considered in the light of comments from the core Neighbourhood Plan group. Shortlisted two, Modicum Planning and CompassPoint Planning. Clerk to request a free/no obligation meeting (with representatives from PC and NPG) with the shortlisted consultants.
- **iii.** Terms of Reference NP working group It was agreed that these would be discussed at a later date in conjunction with the appointment of a consultant as mentor to the group.
- 7.4 Consultation on uses for CIL Funding It was decided to postpone the decision on format for consultation until after the informal meeting to review earmarking of current funds (agenda item 6.4).
- 7.5 Transparency of planning process it was noted that the submission was made to Jo Churchill in support of parishioner's representation as was agreed by email after the last meeting.

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FROM St MARY'S CHURCH WALSHAM le WILLOWS

Glancing through the Church's calendar for June, amongst the Festival Days which make up the month, are several commemorating the martyrdom of Christians; those who have given their lives for both their Christian Faith or because of it.

The list of martyrs, which range across the centuries, are somewhat varied, as also are the places of death; Rome, Uganda, Israel, Cyprus, Germany.... and of course the list is still being added to even during this 21st Century. Indeed it is estimated that statistically Christians make up the largest proportion of those persecuted for religious reasons than any other faith group in the world. Christians suffer in one form or another in over 100 countries.

On the 22nd June the Church remembers one of many martyrs from this country, the first ever English Christian martyr; St Alban, who gave his name to both the Cathedral city and to the Cathedral itself

Alban was born in the late 2nd Century and growing up as a Romano-British pagan, living in what is now known as St Albans. Alban had given refuge to a refugee Christian Priest and eventually Alban was converted himself. When the military came searching for the fugitive Priest, Alban took on the Priests identity, was discovered and after being tortured, was condemned to death. The fugitive Priest, Amphibalus, was subsequently executed as well.

A church was first built on the site of today's Cathedral in the 8th Century, eventually being replaced as an Abbey by the Normans after the 1066 conquest. Later the buildings were to become somewhat neglected, often through lack of funds. In 1539, after the Dissolution of the Monasteries, the buildings were largely ransacked and demolished, except the main body of the church and a few outlying buildings. Over the years the church itself has been used as a prison and an army barracks.

Interest in the buildings was generated in the 18th Century, and by the time of 1877 the church became the Cathedral and Abbey Church of St Alban, and a new Diocese was born. St Albans now being one of the youngest Dioceses in England; although not as young as our own St Edmundsbury and Ipswich Diocese.

Much of the Norman architecture remains, and at 300 feet, it has the longest nave of any Cathedral in England. Unlike most Cathedrals it doubles up as the Parish Church.

Within the grounds is St Albans School, originally founded on the site in 948, making it arguably the oldest Public School in England, and one of the oldest schools in the world.


The Cathedral and the grounds are certainly well worth a visit.

WILDLIFE IN JUNE

Hopefully after the wet May weather we will now be having some warmer, brighter days where we are able to bask in the sunshine. One if the rarest UKs terrestrial species also likes to bask in the sun, the Smooth Snake. This snake is restricted to Dorset, Hampshire and Surrey, they are slow, small and secretive. The distinguishing feature of this snake is that it has a dark smudge on the top of its head, and like the name suggests it is smooth, with no fold at the keel of each scale unlike the Adder and Grass They like to hide in dense clumps of heather and come out to bask in the snake. sunshine ready to hunt small reptiles, birds and small mammal's. They do not kill their prey with venom but constrict their prey like a boa constrictor would. Most Bats now are giving birth to mainly one baby called a pup. You may think given the size of these small bats the baby would be tiny, but compared to the mother it is a monster, it is the equivalent of a human giving birth to a five year old! Nursing bats gather in a single sex maternity roost, occupying buildings that are south facing where the temperatures can reach over 30 degrees Celsius. Some of us will now have Foxgloves in our gardens which give spectacular colour and structure. The petals tubular shape forms a tunnel and at the bottom of this lays the prize of nectar. This tunnel indicates that the pollinator needs a long proboscis to get their reward. Most of these flowers are pollinated by long tongued Bumble Bees, but there is a cheat among them, short tongued Bees bite holes in the tubular blooms to steal the nectar! So if you have Foxgloves in your garden look out for these bite marks. Last month and hopefully in the month of June an Egret has been spotted near Clarkes Of Walsham fishing for tasty morsels, so keep a look out. Also I thought I would mention that after putting my number in the April addition as I volunteer for the Suffolk Hedgehog hospital I had a rescue come in from a very kind lady who had found a small hedgehog out during the day which indicates a problem/ The hedgehogs name is Charlotte and had lungworm, ringworm (a fungal illness. problem) and was a bit on the thin side, but with treatment she is now on the mend. One more saved. If you do see one out during the day, pop them into a box, with a towel, water and food. My number again is 07794709616 or ring a hedgehog rescue Asap.

WALKS AROUND WALSHAM

Into the Nether Regions

Also known as the Hundred Walk, this short walk of 2¹/₂ miles falls at the furthest reaches of the parish. It starts where footpath 1 meets footpath 22. You can park on the grassy verge outside Botany Farm. Look for a marked byway just to the right of Botany Farm. Through the gap in the hedge you find yourself immediately on a raised track between two ditches. The track is ancient, it goes back to Anglo Saxon times and marks the ancient boundary of the Blackbourn and Hartismere hundreds. Today it is still the boundary between Walsham and Westhorpe.

The track is lined to the north with hawthorn. To the south the hedge was cut down to the ground, no doubt in part because it enabled the farmers to clear the ditches, but also because it will encourage wild flowers and dense new growth that will spring up close to the ground, all food for pollinators so essential for food production. It will also provide cover for nesting birds and foraging for small birds and mammals. There were sheep grazing the tops off a cover crop here during the winter. This was not a dabbling in livestock but part of a concerted effort to increase and improve the natural soil ecosystem and reduce the input and subsequent runoff (pollution) of chemicals. To avoid losing all the benefits gained these fields are not ploughed before drilling. The new crop germinates and grows up through last year's stubble. Skylarks nest there too.

At a sharp left corner there is a pond and its surroundings given over to wildlife. Continue towards the Finningham Road. In winter be sure to wear tall wellies, this part can be spectacularly wet and muddy.

At the road turn left and head towards Walsham for almost ¹/₂ mile until you find the finger post on the right-hand side. It is currently lying on the ground beside the hedge, you might have to search for it! From here the path goes diagonally across the field to the far corner on the right. At this point go through the hedge, cross a ditch via two planks and join another ancient route, the Nether Way, which used to be the main track between Walsham and Gislingham. The track is wide here, intentionally so as part of the Countryside Stewardship Scheme to restore habitats and to provide food and nesting places for birds, insects and other animals. It also allows wild flowers and their pollinators to thrive. The stream is delightful, the tree cover affords a sheltered oasis for creatures in a hot summer.

Red deer, roe deer, stoats, green finches, yellow hammers, hares, kestrels, buzzards and red kites might all be seen on a good day. This end of the village is farmed and managed to help wildlife thrive and you will always see something of interest. Just make sure that your dog doesn't flush out nesting birds. Keep them on a lead in the nesting season.

After two more fields you join the road, turn right and head south towards the Finningham Road once more, passing a pond on the corner and everywhere the sweet smell of cow parsley and hawthorn. Turn right, then left back onto the hundred lane and head back along the path that you came along earlier, back to Botany Farm.

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


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SPORTS CLUB NEWS

Preserved Alive

The name John Bunyan is world famous, and in his lifetime, he wrote some sixty-six books, the most famous of which was 'Pilgrim's Progress'. Another very important book that Bunyan wrote was 'Grace Abounding to the Chief of Sinners'. This volume was first published in 1666 when Bunyan was serving a twelve-year prison sentence in Bedford jail for the crime of preaching without a licence. The book is John Bunyan's autobiography; it tells, in his inimitable style, the story of his life and especially his conversion to Christ. The title of the book, which sums up Bunyan's conversion experience, came from a combination of words in two verses of Scripture: Romans 5.20 & 1 Timothy 1:15. The subtitle of this book is: 'A Brief and Faithful Relation of the Exceeding Mercy of God in Christ to his Poor Servant John Bunyan'.

A clear example of God's 'exceeding mercy' to Bunyan was how, on three occasions, he was delivered from death. The first was when he had a nasty encounter with an adder; the second was when he fell out of a boat into the River Ouse in Bedford and almost drowned. The final occasion was when he changed places with another soldier in the army and that soldier was subsequently shot dead on the battlefield. On all these occasions Bunyan was still and unconverted man and knew that, had he died, he would have gone into a lost eternity. When he later spoke of all these incidents his comment was, "Mercy had preserved him alive".

Perhaps you can recall such things in your own experience when you had a close encounter with death and, but for God's intervention, you would have lost your life and been in eternity already? Truly 'mercy has preserved you alive'. Ask yourself this question, why did God preserve my life and give me life each subsequent day? It is not that you continue in sin and rebellion, without thought and love for God, but that you might be saved. The answer is that God has graciously allowed you more time to prepare for eternity. When you consider how good God has been to you and the certainty of eternity to come, does it not cause you to repent of sin and turn to the Lord Jesus Christ for Salvation? Let us urge you to do that today. Come along and hear the way of Salvation for yourself as God's word is preached each week.

THE HUMBLE TELEPHONE KIOSK

During the past twelve months, whilst out on my bike, I have noticed the proliferation of book swaps in disused telephone kiosks - once the lifeline of the 'common man'. 
The exchanging of books is not the only 'function' of these edifices of a near-bygone age. Some have been used for local art exhibitions. The kiosk by The Railway Tavern at Mellis, although having no works of art in it, has wonderfully stained glass windows. A number have been equipped with the modern lifeline - the defibrillator; hopefully those in need are nearby to the kiosk when their disaster strikes.

Whilst having a chat in the Village Hall coffee shop recently, I discovered that the grandfather of a local resident had been a member of Lloyd George's coalition government. Not only had he been responsible for bringing down the cost of letter postage to 1½d (less than 1p in these decimal days). In addition to this assistance to personal communication, he also brought about the introduction of the telephone kiosk since, at the time, telephone communication was the preserve of the wealthy. He was also conscious of the part that well run post offices could play in village life.


How times have changed. The village post office is rapidly disappearing; some are shunted to the back of other stores - or upstairs - as in the case of Bury St Edmunds. The cost of posting a letter, if one should write one instead of dashing of a one-line email, is now 66p (second class) or 85p (first class)! The humble telephone kiosk has all but gone and in case of emergency one has sometimes to rely upon the 'kindness of strangers'!

The next time you pass a smart looking kiosk stop and take a look inside, you might find that a welcome surprise greets you from inside.




