


NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH NEWS



Avian Influenza Prevention Zone

An Avian Influenza Prevention Zone (AIPZ) came into force across Great Britain on the 3rd November 2021. This was extended to include housing measures across the UK on the 29th November 2021.

These measures mean that it is a legal requirement for all bird keepers across the UK (whether they have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) to keep their birds indoors and follow strict biosecurity measures to limit the spread of and eradicate the disease.

For the dog walkers and ramblers of Walsham le Willows, did you know that ...

The Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) carries out year-round avian influenza surveillance of dead wild birds submitted via public reports and warden patrols.

In Great Britain, if you find dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as gulls or birds of prey, you should report them to the **DEFRA** helpline on 03459 33 55 77. Do not touch or pick up any dead or visibly sick birds that you find. Some of these birds are collected and tested to help understand how the disease is distributed geographically and in different types of bird. Wild birds are susceptible to a range of diseases and injuries and not all dead birds will have been infected with avian influenza.

A report is published (updated regularly) on findings of bird flu in wild birds.

Where dead birds are not required for surveillance purposes it is the landowner's responsibility to safely dispose of the carcases.


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WALSHAM-LE-WILLOWS CEVC PRIMARY SCHOOL

We have all been working really hard this half term and getting into the swing of things with various different Christmas activities. The children from Caterpillar and Ladybird classes put on a lovely Nativity in the church which parents were able to see and it was lovely to see everyone together sharing in this performance.

Our theme for Collective Worship this half term has been Respect and the children have demonstrated so many different ways we can show respect to each other. Some children from year 6 went to The Beeches care home to pass on the donations from parents for others and it is great to see our school caring for others in the community.

The children in Caterpillar class were very excited to perform in church and have been learning about the First Christmas Story. They have been showing respect to others whilst playing Dodgeball as part of their PE lessons

The children in Ladybirds have continued to look at exploring Enchanted Woodlands and have been deciduous and evergreen plants. They have looked at the lifecycle of a leaf and decomposition. 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
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THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN Household Survey


Appeal for Help with Transport

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
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DILGY POLLARD

This month's cover is of Dilgy Pollard with two of his chestnut Suffolk Punches turned out in their best for the Drawing Match, an important village event in those days.

When I first knew the farm there was no tractor, just six horses to do all the work. They all had names beginning with M. The biggest was Major they naughtiest Monkey.

They passed the house each evening on their way to the stables with their horseman sittings sideways on their backs, the reins hanging loose. They knew the way home.

The stables were just behind Brook Farmhouse. Large double doors gave on to a straw covered yard half of it was open to the sky and half covered which sheltered the hay racks and mangers at the back. A door at one side led to the six stalls each with a hay rack above a manger.

It was here that the horses were rubbed down and fed with meal from the meal-house next door. On the walls around the stalls were brackets holding the huge horse collars, and the whole range of harnesses needed for different tasks, cart saddles, breeching straps and swingle trees to name just a few. For special occasions the leather and brass of the harness would be polished until it shone.

In charge of all of this was Dilgy Polllard the Head Horseman. I was six at the time and Dilgy was one of the most important men I knew. I know he was justly proud of his horses and that he was reputed to have secret remedies to cure almost any horse ailment, but what I chiefly remember was his huge turnip watch.

Our social calendar came to an end for 2021when members and guests enjoyed a Christmas Lunch at the Cock Inn where an excellent meal was provided by Nigel and his staff.

Philip Boyle a nephew of a crew member who died when a Wellington Bomber crashed at Wrenshall Walsham le Willows was seeking information about the crash which we have now been able to give him. The aircraft had taken off from RAF Newmarket 24th May 1942 and flown to Duxford for a briefing with a Spitfire pilot of 609 Squadron before both aircraft took off at 3 20pm for a training exercise. At approximately 4pm while taking evasive action from a simulated attack by the Spitfire the Wellington had taken a steep turn when a structural failure occurred in the right wing causing it to break off at 7000 ft resulting in the crash , killing the five crew members and a further four who were on board for the trip., the youngest being Cadet Bryan Long aged just 17years. Ideas are being sought of a possible memorial to remember them after 80 years one suggestion is a Memorial Plaque in the museum within the control tower on the old Rougham Airfield.

HELP! "I NEED SOMEBODY,

Not Just Anybody! Please, Please Help Me, Help Me"


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Mid Suffolk

I'm a bit anxious about going out into shops at the moment so I want to do more shopping online, but there's been things in the news about delivery problems. I'm worried about not receiving things on time or packages being lost. What should I do if my parcel goes missing?

When you're online shopping, it's not always clear whom to contact if things go wrong. As a customer, your contract is with the seller that you bought the item from. It's the seller's responsibility to make sure the item is delivered to you. They should chase the courier to find out what happened to your order if there's a problem.

If your parcel hasn't arrived:

- Check the delivery address you gave the seller, to make sure it's correct.
- Then contact the seller and ask where your order is.
- If the seller claims they've delivered it or doesn't know where it is, you can ask for a redelivery. You might be able to get a refund in some circumstances where the delivery time was essential and you let the seller know ahead of time.

Under the Consumer Rights Act 2015, you can ask the seller to deliver the item to you again if the item wasn't delivered either by an agreed date, or within a reasonable time - usually within 30 days.

If the new delivery fails to come within a reasonable time, you can ask the seller for a refund.

If your parcel was left somewhere:

Another problem people face is when parcels get left in different places, for example outside or with a neighbour.

If your item was delivered by Royal Mail:

If Royal Mail left your package with a neighbour or in a certain place because you told them to, it's not the seller or Royal Mail's responsibility if it gets lost.

If they leave it somewhere you hadn't instructed, it's the seller's responsibility if it gets lost. You should contact the seller to ask for a redelivery or a refund.

If the item was delivered by a courier:

Check your terms and conditions or account details - they might include other places for delivery, like your porch or a neighbour's house. If you agreed to them, it's not the seller's or courier's responsibility if your order has gone missing. However if you did not agree to this, then it's the sellers responsibility if your order goes missing.

If you ordered something from a private seller or you're still having trouble after trying the tips above, you can contact Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk for help.

- 1.4 The minutes of the budget meeting held on 24th November were approved as a true and accurate record and signed by Cllr Belson as Chair. The Clerk advised correspondence from a parishioner re **minutes for meeting held on 10th November 2021 (reference to Greenside minute 2, 3rd bullet point)** bringing to attention an error. The minutes stated that that planning permission had been refused. This was a minuting error. A previous application has been withdrawn. The Clerk advised that this had been spotted subsequent to the publication of the minutes and proposed a correction be minuted which was duly approved.
- **REPORTS FOR INFORMATION** to receive written reports for information only [district and county reports previously circulated and posted on village website]:
- 2.1 **Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group** Phil Newby reported that survey data input continues; noted the excellent and very coherent character appraisal work done by Sally Johnston with more to do to complete; the group has launch Zoom

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
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meeting with AECOM on 13th re work on the Housing Needs Assessment – this is a desktop exercise which will link with the Household Survey results; Work on the Design Code which will give the village the ability to set rules on how new developments should look kicked off this week with an AECOM site visit planned for January; The group will look at all these key pieces of work in January in the light of the Household Survey results. Cllr Mecrow concurred that work was moving apace. Cllr Bartholomew asked about response rates; 100 so far and hoping for 200; Cllr Belson extremely pleased with how consultants are assisting and hoping for a draft plan in the new year. Clerk to arrange more comms on website, Facebook and Observer.

- 2.2 County Councillor Jessica Fleming advised that approaches to SCC Highways re site visits about the locations for village gates would now have to be made directly by the Parish Council in the new year. Cllr Roberts to send information to Clerk for forwarding to highways and cc to Cllr Fleming. Cllr Fleming advised that any proposals for road reconfigurations might be dealt with at the same site visit. Cllr Mecrow raised the concerns about the proposed development on the Stanton site near the A143. It was agreed that a response is required, and Cllr Fleming has also agreed to follow this up.
- 2.3 **District Councillor Richard Meyer** had previously given his apologies to the Clerk.

- 4 PLANNING APPLICATIONS TO BE CONSIDERED incl. any received after the publication of this agenda & PLANNING MATTERS [to be brought to the attention of the council]
- 4.1 **Stanton Development reference DC/21/02384** Following on from the discussion with Cllr Fleming, Cllr Belson led on the formulation of a response which was unanimously approved for submission to West Suffolk Planning.
 - Objections to <u>possible</u> Planning Application Land At Shepherds Grove Stanton Suffolk use of 27.56 hectares of the application site (Stanton for storage and distribution use (B8 Use Class), in connection with the storing, distribution and processing of accident damaged and non-damaged motor vehicles, together with the erection of ancillary buildings, perimeter fencing and landscaping works.
 - 1. Sequencing of the development is required in relation to the road infrastructure to limit the impact of development traffic on surrounding villages, especially Walsham le Willows. Proper access needs to be in place <u>before</u> any development work starts on the site.


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- 2. The scale of potential traffic movements, both construction traffic and then traffic arising from business activity on the site during and following completion. This will result in huge increases in heavy goods and individual car traffic.
- 3. The concrete access road shown is still shown on the scoping documentation. There is concern that this should not be used for access for construction traffic as this has a junction with Sumner Road and will encourage avoidance of the A143.
- 4. The proposed business activity does not seem appropriate or sustainable in such a rural location. The documentation notes proximity to the M11, A11 and A1 as advantages. None of these roads can be considered proximate for business activity requiring such connections without considerable impacts upon the surrounding villages.
- 5. The employment potential whilst welcomed is wholly dependent on one activity. Employment will be largely unskilled and there are concerns as to how many local people would benefit from this.
- 6. The site sits on an aquifer. Oils lubricants, petrol, anti-freeze all need careful controls and the risk to the aquifer from these substances is acknowledged.
- 7. There is no reason for top-soil to be removed as banking and bounding would be needed to address issues arising.
- 8. There is a large amount of offset (from building) with all the bio-diverse planting towards the Walsham end of the site.
- 9. Three potential developments are proposed there is no proven need for roadside development and the failure of the Duke of Marlborough pub would seem to support this view.

It was resolved to ask Cllr Meyer to organise a meeting between the potentially affected parishes. Clerk to contact Cllr Meyer to ask him to organise with involvement of Wattisfield, Walsham le Willows, Stanton, Hepworth, Great Barton, Bardwell and Norton.



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
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discussion concluded that the parish councillors whom are also involved in the neighbourhood plan are to represent the views of the Parish Council. With parish councillors actively involved in the NP there is adequate opportunity to raise any issues of concern to the Parish Council with the wider group. Neighbourhood plan will remain an agenda item so views and opinions can be gathered and coordinated.

7 PLAY AREA DEVELOPMENT

- 7.1 Sub-committee report Cllr Kinnair reported that the £9k bid has been validated and looked likely to be approved. Receipt of the last of three quotes is imminent and it has been confirmed that contact with the planning dept. at MSDC is not needed as this is a re-development of an existing area already used as a play park. The application form for the 15k CIL bid has been completed. Cllr Kinnair will check if the absence of Parish Council policies on Equal Opportunities, Environment and Safeguarding responsibilities would impact the decision to grant funding. The Clerk reminded that the Parish Council had previously been advised that there is no safeguarding responsibility with regard to the play area which is an open public space over which the Parish Council has limited control.
- 7.2 **RoSPA report** The Parish Council resolved that with the re-development in mind and the fact that there are no urgent matters, that no action would be taken at this time.
- 7.3 **Enquiry from parishioner re development plans** Cllr Kinnair clarified the situation and provided a response which as approved. The Clerk to respond to parishioner.

8 CLERK'S REPORTS

- 8.1 **Reconciliation to 30th November 2021** The ledger reconciles with the bank balances which were duly approved and signed by Cllr Kinnair. The Clerk referred to the response from SALC re the handling of VAT in the ledger and the budgeting process. Clerk to make adjustments with help of Cllr Bartholomew if needed.
- 8.2 **Request for payments** The summary of payments has been circulated in advance of the meeting and were approved then signed by Cllrs Bartholomew and Kinnair.

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

- 8.3 CIL Funding Project List the Parish Council considered the information previously circulated on potential projects following a response from the CIL team. The list of projects was finalised into a summary of those completed, underway and future projects. There remain some unresolved questions about some major projects which are being worked on. CIL funding was approved for 2021/22 for the recent major repairs to the churchyard wall (£7478.00), repair and refurbishment of the village sign (£247.50), the provision of a new stage for the Memorial Hall (£5029.23), streetlighting upgrades phase iiii and the final phase (£13,099.30). For 2022/23 £15,000 has been committed towards the redevelopment of the play area. (All figures exclude VAT) Quotes are required for the replacement of the Four Ashes finger board, allotment shed repairs and possible installation of village gates. Amounts for these projects have not yet been finalised or approved.
- 8.4 **CIL & Earmarked Reserves** reviewed and approved following from the decisions on CIL projects. Clerk to make changes to the reserve positions on the reconciliation report.
- 8.5 **Budget 2022/23** the budget was set having been finalised and approved as follows: Income £70,489.44, Expenditure £57,062.44, leaving a surplus £13,427.00. This surplus is entirely due to the previous and future receipts of CIL funding which will all be received over the space two years but is spent over five years as projects are determined and approved.
- 8.6 **Precept claim 2022/23** it was unanimously agreed to set the precept at £22,250.00. This represents an increase of 0.96% on 2021/22 and equates to an extra 0.44p per household. This is calculated on the basis of 483.79 Band D (equivalent) properties in the Parish (as advised by MSDC).
- 8.7 **Problem Reports SCC** The Clerk advised no particular issues of note. Clerk to report the replanting of the hedge on the boundary of The Acorns with Wattisfield Road to SCC Highways and advise to MSDC Planning. Also to ask Planning authority to follow up on the planting of the hedge to the western boundary of The Acorns which was meant to be completed in the first planting season.
- 8.8 **Action Log** Clerk to advise anything **of note or review**. It was proposed and approved to purchase a gift for Gareth Rees for his excellent voluntary work on the Play Area and Bus Shelter for the Parish Council. Cllr Roberts to source and pass the invoice to the Clerk. Clerk to check with other Parishes on who they use for pavement sweeping to see what this turns up.

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
WILDLIFE IN JANUARY

I hope everyone had a lovely Christmas and I wish you a happy New Year! I cannot believe I have been writing this wildlife section for a whole year now, where does the time go? I am enjoying writing and I hope more importantly you are enjoying reading. In the November edition I put a bit in about Hedgehogs and how I foster for the Suffolk Hedgehog Hospital, due to this information it has lead to some prickly friends being rescued around the village which were too small to hibernate if the weather turned cold or too small to find enough to eat without relying on fat reserves, so well done to you that rescued them and gave me a call. I have quite a few at the moment to look after until the release in Spring.

Another secretive animal is the Roe Deer, they can be seen all year round, they are a medium sized deer with short antlers and they have no visible tail. They are solitary in the summer but in winter months form small groups, living on average for 7-10 years, normally you will see them on the fields as you take a walk around. These Deer started mating back in July but the females have a clever trick to avoid having their young in the cold winter months when food is scarce. They may mate in July but their body delays the implantation of the already fertilised egg until this month of January, this ensures the young are then born into the warmer months when food is more readily available.

There have been some lovely Lichens, mosses and Fungi around this year due to the damp mild weather, Beard Lichen will hang off the trees this month in great beardy tufts. Their filigree form is known as fruticose, this form captures the rain or dew that makes them glisten. The side of the tree that has the most growth is the direction of the prevailing wind. Some trees will start reproduction this month and Catkins can be seen at this time of year normally beginning with the Hazel tree that will produce Catkins from January to March, and if the weather stays mild you may see them on the Alder tree but usually these are not seen until February. Catkins are made up of little flowers that allow the tree to reproduce allowing the female flowers to be pollinated by the pollen of the male flower by the wind. On the Hazel tree the Catkins can be either male or female but they cannot self pollinate, the female flowers are a small vase shaped bud with red filaments sticking out. If they are pollinated they will become Hazelnuts in the Autumn. Catkins are always a welcomed sight bringing back memories of childhood when you would pretend they were caterpillars and maybe throw them at your friends!

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BLACKCURRANT MERINGUE TART

Ingredients

5 Egg yolks

5 Egg whites

1 cup Sugar (divided)

3 cups Plain flour

250 gms Butter (room temp)

2 tblsp Cocoa powder

2 tblsp Baking powder

Blackcurrant jam

Method

In a medium bowl, beat together the egg yolks and ½ cup of sugar until thick and lemon -coloured.

In a large bowl, mix together the flour, baking powder and butter, and then add the eggyolk mixture and mix thoroughly.

Divide the dough into 3 pieces and mix one portion with the cocoa powder, until well blended.

Wrap each piece of dough in plastic wrap and refrigerate for 3 hours.

Heat oven to 175°C. Lightly coat a 13in by 9in pan with cooking spray. Take out one piece of dough and roll it to fit the bottom of the prepared pan and bake it for 10 - 15 min. After that spread the jam evenly over the base of the cake. Remove the cocoa-flavoured dough from the refrigerator and grate it on top of the fruit filling.

In a medium bowl, beat the egg whites with the remaining ½ cup of sugar until stiff peaks form and spread on top of the grated cocoa dough.

Remove the last portion of dough from the refrigerator and grate it on top of the egg whites.

Bake for 40 minutes, until the egg whites are set and the top is golden brown.

Let it cool completely in the pan before slicing and serving.

Certainty in Uncertain Times

As the clock strikes midnight and the calendars turn from one year to the next, we may feel glad to leave the old year behind us, with all its trials and difficulties, and look forward to better days. However, it rather looks as if 2022, with rising inflation and rapidly spreading COVID, will also have its share of challenges.

To us these may seem uncertain times, but to our Sovereign God, who is eternal and unchangeable, nothing is uncertain but rather everything is under His control and in His purpose; after all, has He not 'made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all that in them is' (Acts 4:24). Indeed, the Bible speaks of difficult times in the 'last days' of this world and warns of wars, famines, diseases and natural disasters (Matthew 24:6-14) but tells us not to be troubled and points to the Gospel being preached in all the nations of the world before the end comes. It is this glorious Gospel (Good News) of the Lord Jesus Christ that brings hope and joy into the darkness of this world. It is this wonderful Good News that we have been reminded of over the Christmas period: 'God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life' (John 3:16) and 'Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners' (1 Timothy 1:15).

It is clear to see that we live in a world that is far from its created perfection, that it is fallen and spoiled with sin, and we can see from Scripture that the troubles and disasters we see around warn us that all is not well, and that we as individuals and nations need to be reconciled to God.
