



#### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH NEWS

Anyone who knows who was responsible should contact Suffolk police, quoting 37/5293/22.


Action Fraud UK are reminding you that fake emails and text messages are a common tactic used by cyber criminals, their goal is often to convince you to click a link. Once clicked, you may be sent to a dodgy website which could download viruses onto your computer, or steal your passwords and personal information. In order to try and convince you that their messages are legitimate, criminals will pretend to be someone you trust, or from some organisation you trust. This could be your Internet Service Provider (ISP), local council, even a friend in need. And they may contact you by phone call, email or text message.

Reporting suspicious emails: If you have received an email which you're not quite sure about, you can report it by forwarding the email to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service at: report@phishing.gov.uk From November 2021, the number of reported suspicious emails stands at more than 8,100,000, with the removal of more than 67,000 scams and 124,000 URLs.

Reporting suspicious text messages: You can report suspicious text messages to your mobile network provider, for free, by forwarding the text to 7726. If you forward a text, your provider can investigate the origin of the text and take action, if found to be malicious. If 7726 doesn't work, you can find out how to report a text message by contacting your provider.





#### WALSHAM WILD WOOD



Our priority is to create green spaces to promote a wide variety of plant species and wildlife.

To commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee we are passionate about planting a new piece of woodland or hedging on behalf of the whole community. We are writing to individuals and organisations across the parish who may be able to help us find a suitable piece of land for the commemorative planting. The land could be rented on a long term lease as our current piece is or may possibly be purchased and would be planted and managed by the Wild Wood steering group. The Queen is actively promoting this as part of her legacy through the Queen's Green Canopy initiative.

In these times when the urgency of the crisis facing our native insects, birds and plant species is well documented, we are seeking to create and manage a further area of land within our village. This land could be large or small, could be a new woodland or could be a green corridor within the farming landscape dedicated to providing space for species to recover and thrive. This Platinum year of Queen Elizabeth II's reign coincides with our organisation's tenth anniversary making it an ideal time for us to increase our endeavours.

Ten years ago we committed ourselves to create and manage a new area of mixed woodland on land leased from the Old Town Trust. With support from the Woodland Trust and many individuals and organisations within the village this is exactly what we have achieved. In this instance, the young wood we began planting in 2012 has become a feature of the village valued by many as recorded in the gathering of public opinion as part of the Neighbourhood Plan. It has been used as a learning space by the village primary school; as a meeting place for the WI; as a place for sitting and watching the world; as part of a running track by the Sports Club and as a place for families and friends to meet and enjoy the outdoors on Easter hunts, picnics, pizza evenings and pumpkin trails.

Moreover, the maintenance of the rides, the scattering of seeds and simply allowing species to return has resulted in a wide variety of plant, bird and insect varieties enjoying the woodland habitat. Our proudest moment was finding several orchids last Spring growing within the wood for the first time.





#### CITIZENS ADVICE



I've just been offered a new job and now I need to tell my current employer. The new company wants me to start as soon as possible. The problem is, we're already a bit short-staffed where I am now and I don't know how soon I'll be allowed to leave. How should I bring all this up with my boss?

Congratulations on your new role. It can feel awkward telling your current employer you're moving on. The time between telling your employer you've found a new position and you actually leaving is known as your notice period.

If you've been in your current job for less than a month, you won't have to give any notice period (unless your contract says otherwise). If it's more than a month, you'll have to give at least one week's notice. Your contract should make it clear exactly how long is expected.

If you don't have a contract, and your employer has no written record of you agreeing to a notice period, you should give at least one week's notice.

It's worth waiting until your new employer has confirmed your employment, for example by giving you a start date before handing in your resignation. It's then best to resign in writing (email is fine), so that you have a record of the date you told your employer. On the Citizens Advice website we have a section on resigning with tips on how to write this letter. This can be found at citizensadvice.org.uk/work/leaving-a-job.

You can work a longer notice than the one in your contract, if you agree it with your employer. If you're keen to move on sooner rather than later, it may also be possible to negotiate a shorter notice period than your contract says. If you want to go down this route, it can be useful to reassure your current employer that you will tackle any urgent work before finishing.


Fixed-term contracts are a bit different, as you won't need to give notice if you intend to leave on the last day of contract. Leaving early would usually mean giving at least one week's notice, unless your contract says otherwise.

Don't forget about your holiday days during your notice period. If you have unused paid holiday you should speak to your employer about either taking these during the notice period or being paid for them.

Finally, sometimes people can change their mind about moving jobs or find their circumstances alter. If this happens to you, you should speak to your current employer to see what the options are and if you can stay in your current role.







designated in the LP has been based on inaccurate information (see agenda item 6); receipt of the first draft of the Housing Policy. Coming next: Policies on Green Spaces; non-designated heritage assets (those that may have been missed); streetlighting and 'dark skies' initiatives. Meyer thought that this was unlikely as no planning permission had yet been granted and that the agent would have been unlikely to have committed on that basis. It was agreed that Cllrs Roberts and Mecrow would attend the meeting with Jaynic for local Parish Councils on 24<sup>th</sup> February at 7.30pm. Cllr Winch will step in if required. Agreed primary goal is to raise concerns and gather information to better inform the response as the inevitable planning application proceeds. Cllr Meyer thought it in Jaynic's interests to accommodate concerns when the application is made although he also noted concerns about there being no requirement for cross district consultation/engagement in situations such as this where an application might have negative impacts on neighbouring communities whilst being positive for those in area. He also noted that West Suffolk uses \$106 rather than CIL funding to which villages like Walsham will not have access with the perverse outcome that those communities that benefit from the development receive this funding whilst those adversely affected receive none. Cllr Meyer suggests raising this as an issue of concern along with those already submitted.

- 6 NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN GROUP (NPG)
- 6.1 Cllr Mecrow reported on NPG discussions about the Settlement Hierarchy and the fact that Walsham had been incorrectly designated as 'core' village in the Local Plan. It was felt that the Parish Council should make a representation based on the scoring criteria, to have a redesignation as a 'hinterland' village which would reduce the amount of units that would be required should the housing requirement increase. Clerk to draft for agreement a representation to Robert Hobbs at MSDC setting out the case and send once approved.
- 6.2 The Clerk asked Councillors to confirm that they had all received the previously circulated submitted declarations of interest and emails with original advice from the consultants, the Clerk's advice to Council on that basis and the consultants updated advice; The Clerk asked for confirmation on that basis, that Council was satisfied that all declarations had now been satisfactorily received (once updated as has been proposed). This was unanimously agreed. Clerk to follow up.

- 8.2.1 CIL award for Staging for Memorial Hall the Parish Council unanimously approved the revised quote from supplier, previously circulated, advising an increase in costs of £599.02. Total to be posted against the CIL budget, £5628.25 excl. vat

- 8.5 **Review of Clerk's Contract and pay scale** The Clerk advised that pay scales and changes from 2017 had been checked and all was in order. No action needed.
- 8.6 **Problem Reports SCC** Clerk advised nothing of note of which councillors were not already aware.
- 8.7 **Action Log** Clerk advised nothing note of which councillors were not already aware councillors quickly ran through the log.
- 9 MATTERS ARISING [from previous meeting only where further decisions are required]
- 9.1 **Village gates** Due to an oversight the Clerk feels that this was not properly considered. Take forward to next agenda. Clerk seeking clarification in meantime.
- 9.2 **Four Ashes Finger Post** It was decided not to proceed with either the licence for installation or the purchase until a firm quote for installation has been received from SCC Highways and approved.
- 9.3 Bid for centrally held CIL funds for major highways works and potential land purchase The Parish Council decided that this was practically outside the scope of the Parish Council's spending capacity and in any case that it would be very difficult to get Highways engagement to move it forward. It was decided not to take this matter forward at this time.
- 9.4 Village Stream Maintenance The Parish Council considered the quotes that have been obtained and the Clerk's assessment of discussions with the three contractors. It was decided to award the contract to CGM at a value of £1881.00 per annum for stream maintenance and £35 per cut of stream verges (all excl. vat), and to review after one year. CGM can combine the cutting of the verges with the cutting that takes place at the Play area and were the only contractor that did not require the PC to find a location to dispose of arisings from work on stream banks and trees. They also provided the most detailed quote and plan for maintenance.
- 9.5 **Litter Pick Signage** The Parish Council decided to go ahead with the order of signage in aluminium as the most durable option. Clerk to action.

#### 10 OTHER ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

10.1 Clerk's Appraisal – Cllr Belson reported back to Councillors. Proposals to leave Clerk's contracted hours at 18 plus overtime (at Clerk's request) and base paid annual leave on those hours, was approved. The proposal to remove the requirement for an annual appraisal was not approved. Three objectives were set that align with items on the current action log (review and update of the Community Emergency Plan, presentation of annual review of policies for approval over two meetings early in the year and the establishment of a suitable pattern of management for the public area alongside the village stream. - gave clear advice that the Parish Council did not have the power approve this. The Clerk was asked to make further enquiries of the referrer and if possible other village organisations to see if there was any way help could be given.
- 11.2 Food Bank Cllr Bartholomew appraised the Council of the huge increase in demand for this service since it was started. The Food bank is now having to use reserves to buy more and more supplies. The general consensus was that the level of need was not likely to abate anytime soon and on the contrary, was only set to increase with imminent changes to personal taxation and the rising costs of living that are expected soon. Cllr Bartholomew asked if the Parish Council could provide some financial support. It was proposed that the £250 award from Cllr Meyer's Locality Budget was matched. This was approved unanimously. Cllr Winch offered to draft a letter for publication that might encourage those who might be able, to make more regular donations.
- 11.3 **Email re condition of Fishponds Lane** This was discussed and it was felt that the condition of the lane deteriorated during the work that UKPN undertook for Lovell's in relation to installing power supply cables for the Acorns development. It has been made unpassable for many and is one of the oldest paths in the village. The Clerk was asked to write to Lovells to ask that they fund the restoration by chain-harrowing and re-seeding.

#### FROM ST MARY'S CHURCH

As you read this article we will be into March, a time of year when we see a change in the season. Spring arrives later in the month; the days get longer, the mornings and evenings lighter, there is an abundance of flowers in our gardens and churchyards, and at the same time the leaves begin reappearing upon our trees and in our hedgerows. In the natural world all around us, we see tangible changes with the signs of Spring signifying new life and new beginnings.

It is not just in the Earthly seasons that we see changes. Within the Churches calendar we move into the season of Lent. Lent is a time of reflection; the colours in our churches are changed to purple, and there is a noticeable absence of flowers within our church buildings. This year Lent begins upon March 2<sup>nd</sup>, Ash Wednesday, with a 9.30am service in Finningham church.

As part of the preparation and self-denial towards Easter, it has been traditional for people to give something up for Lent. Yet equally, in more recent times it has become increasingly popular to take something on board; something that is of spiritual benefit to ourselves or/and general benefit to others.

On each of the Mondays during Lent there will be a Bible Study held in Finningham church from 2.00pm-3.00pm; all of course are warmly welcome.

Yet Lent does not have to be solely for those who would acknowledge a Christian faith. Lent affords us all the opportunity to take stock of our daily lives.

Two days after Ash Wednesday, on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> March, there will be an informal 'service' in St Mary's Church Walsham, at the new time of 2.30pm, to mark Women's World Day of Prayer (**not** solely for women!). This year the focus will be upon England, Wales and Northern Ireland; appropriate refreshments will follow. All of course are warmly welcome.

## WILDLIFE IN MARCH

This month the Spring Equinox is here, and the date will be on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> of March, something to look forward to! While the weather is warming up animals and insects are coming out of either hibernation or torpor, bringing life to the landscape once more. Little birds are getting more active and searching for nesting sites and gathering nesting material. You can help these little birds out by gathering a few twigs, bits of moss or even dog or rabbit hair to hang up in little bunches ready for them to take away. As well as birds something else may be hovering in the air at around head height, this is the Dark Edged Bee Fly, which is widely spread throughout Britain. You will often hear it before seeing it as it make a loud humming noise as it hovers in the air scanning the surrounding area. If you look closely it has a very large proboscis which is used to collect nectar from deep petalled flowers such as Primroses or Ground Ivy. They are called Bee Fly as they look very much like a Bee and there is a reason for this disguise. It is not to deter predators away but to enable the female to get close enough to a ground nesting Bee, particularly Mining Bees, once close enough she will flick her eggs close to the burrow. Once the eggs hatch into maggots they will crawl down the Bees burrow and eat the helpless Bee Larvae!

On evenings look out for Smooth Newts, this is their breeding season and they can be found in your ponds, but on wet evenings they will come out onto land in search of food. They eat Slugs, Caterpillars and worms, they will also eat tadpoles from frogs and Toads. They are a grey/brown colour on top with black spots with an orange belly and they live for an average of 6 years. Eggs will be laid individually in the water wrapped around some pond weed, and an interesting way to tell Newt tadpoles from Frog or Toad tadpoles is that Newt tadpoles develop their front legs first, whereas Frog and Toad tadpoles develop their back legs first.

As Spring arrives so does the colour of yellow flowers in our gardens and on our walks. Have you wondered why there are more yellow flowers in spring? The colour yellow has been proven to be highly effective in attracting insects for pollination, particularly in lower light levels in the shorter daylight hours. One flower that we are certain to come across is the Daffodil which can brighten anyone's day. Daffodils have a wild cousin called the Lent Lily, these wild Daffodils are shorter in length and paler in colour than the ones we will get in the plant nurseries. Enjoy the sight of these flowers on your walks, spring is on the way!

## PORTER CAKE

4 oz butter 1 tsp mixed spice 4 oz soft brown sugar ½ pint Guinness

2 eggs, lightly beaten8 oz flour6 oz raisins6 oz sultanas

½ tsp baking powder Finely grated rind of 1 lemon

Set oven to 325°F (170°C) or Mark 3. Grease and line a 7in (18cm) round cake tin. Cream together the butter and sugar in a bowl until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs a little at a time with a little flour. Sift together the remaining flour, the baking powder and spice and fold into the mixture. Add the Guinness, beating well, then stir in the dried fruit and lemon rind. Put into the tin and bake for about 1½ hours until a skewer inserted comes out clean. Allow to cool completely in the tin, then wrap in greaseproof paper and kitchen foil and store for a week to 10 days before eating.

If desired, this cake can be fed halfway through the storing time. Unwrap the cake, pierce holes in its base with a fine skewer and pour over a dessertspoon of Guinness. Leave for 40 minutes before rewrapping.

#### I do my Best.

John Taylor-Smith (April 20<sup>th</sup> 1860–March 28<sup>th</sup> 1938) was born in Kendal, Westmorland and became a well know Anglican Bishop of his day, going on to serve as Bishop of Sierra Leone, Head of the Army Chaplin Department and Chaplin to Queen Victoria. Although being a man of high office, Taylor-Smith's desire was always to personally witness to people about the Lord Jesus Christ, taking every opportunity to challenge others about the need to be ready for eternity. Let every Christian follow his example, in this respect, and be a daily witness for the Lord (Acts 1:8).

On one occasion, Bishop Taylor-Smith was in the barber's shop for a shave, and whilst being shaved he chatted with the barber and asked him if he had ever given any thought to the matters of eternity and Salvation. The barber had no desire to discuss the subject so gave the bishop a very sharp answer, "I do my best and that's it!" Taylor-smith said nothing more and continued with his shave. However, when he had vacated his chair and the next customer was seated, Taylor-Smith asked the barber, "May I shave this customer please?" The barber was most alarmed at the suggestion, and fearing for his customers safety, replied, "No you may not!" "But I would do my best" Taylor-Smith protested. The barber answered, "Your best would not be good enough for this customer." "That's right," Taylor-Smith replied gently, "nor is your best good enough for God."

There are very many people just like that barber who, if asked if they are ready for Heaven, will answer that they are doing their best because they think they can get to Heaven by their own efforts or merit. What people fail to understand is that our very best efforts cannot satisfy a perfect, holy God. In fact, the Scriptures tell us that 'We are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags.' (Isaiah 64:6). The New Testament also says, 'For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God' (Romans 3.23). The best efforts that we can make, regardless of who we are or what status we hold in life, fall far short of what is required for the Salvation of the soul. It is vital to grasp that none are saved by anything they can do, but by what Christ has already done. Salvation is by Christ alone; it is not man centered; it is Christ centered - apart from Christ there is no Salvation. The apostle Peter plainly stated, 'Neither is there salvation in any other' (Acts 4:12). It is the Lord Jesus Christ alone that has met God's standard and provided for the sinner a perfect righteousness: the way then to receive Salvation is for our trust to be in Him alone.




