
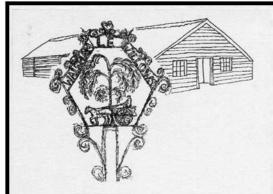



NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH NEWS



With Openreach upgrading broadband in many areas in Suffolk, new cabling is vulnerable to theft, causing considerable inconvenience and cost to the contractors and users. **Police** are appealing for witnesses to the theft of a large amount of cabling in nearby Pakenham.

The incident took place overnight, between 7.30pm on Monday 4 April and 6.50am on Tuesday 5 April in Thurston Road, Pakenham. The offenders removed a 300 metre length of metal cable from a large duct in the ground. The cable is used to supply telephone and broadband services, is very heavy and would have required a number of people to lift it.

This theft is believed to be linked to another incident in Thurston Road in the village that took place between 5pm on Tuesday 29 March and 7am on Wednesday 30 March. Again, this involved the theft of an underground cable.

Any witnesses or anyone with information regarding either theft should contact Suffolk police quoting crime reference 37/18993/22 for the theft on 29/30 March or 37/20077/22 for the theft on 4/5 April.

Suffolk Police are taking part in the annual operation to deter the theft of rare birds' eggs now the nesting season is under way. Operation Easter was developed in Scotland 25 years ago and engages forces across the UK under the leadership of the National Wildlife Crime Unit (NWCU).

The operation targets egg thieves by sharing intelligence to support enforcement action. In recent years the operation has also been expanded to cover some emerging trends of criminal behaviour such as the online trade in eggs and the disturbance of nests for photography.

The taking of wild bird eggs is a serious crime – whole clutches of eggs can be taken from some of the UK's rarest birds with potentially devastating impacts and stored in secret collections.

If you have any information on egg thieves, or those who disturb rare nesting birds without a license, you should contact your local police by phoning 101 and ask to speak to Sgt Brian Calver. Information can also be passed in confidence to Crimestoppers via 0800 555 111.

Police are releasing images of power tools, including chainsaws and other items that were found in a vehicle that failed to stop for officers in Ipswich recently. Officers have released images of a number of items found that they believe may have been stolen from within Suffolk or neighbouring counties. Items can be viewed on the Suffolk Constabulary website within the Latest News thread.





We are about to have 3 Ukrainian families join us in Walsham! It has taken some time to get through the UK Visa application process but we seem to have made it through at last. We are sure everyone will make them very welcome.

The families we currently know off staying in Walsham will be:

- Olena and her sons Kyryl (13) and Nikita (10) who will be staying with Janette and Richard Winch.
- Ksenia and Dmytro who will be staying with Gabrielle and Henry Hunt.
- Olga and her sons Oleg (7) and Mykhailo (4) who will be staying with Judith and Garth Harlow.

If there are any other families that we don't know about please let us know.

We understand from Mid Suffolk Council via the Environmental Housing Officer who visited that they are currently dealing with several hundred family placements in the mid Suffolk / Babergh area. He carried out an inspection of the accommodation and checked documentation of the hosts for Safeguarding.

We are hoping that Nikita and Oleg will go to Walsham School and that Kyryl will go to Thurston. (It would be great if there was someone in Year 8 at Thurston who goes on the bus and who could be a 'buddy' for Kyryl starting at the school)

There are lots of other practical things to sort out and a lot of people want to know how they can help. Initially we are thinking that we need to let the families settle and then let them decide what they feel they need.

We are sure there will be lots of help needed as we go forward.



WALSHAM-LE-WILLOWS CEVC PRIMARY SCHOOL

We now find ourselves in the Easter holidays and we were able to celebrate the end of term with a service in the church; it was lovely to finally have all the children and parents together again to celebrate this special time of year. We also had a lovely Easter Egg Hunt with all of the eggs kindly paid for by the PTA.

Our learning for the Caterpillar and Ladybird Classes culminated in them visiting the planetarium set up in the hall that allowed them to be fully immersive in space and the universe. They rehearsed

together to sing the songs for our service and as part of their RE learning, made Easter cards and took part in an Easter trail to follow the Easter story.

The children in Dragonfly class have been working with visitors to find out what school life was like at the start of the Queen's reign. They have created an information leaflet based on the previous work in English and this has bene submitted as part of a time capsule competition being run by the organisers of The Suffolk Show.

The children in Grasshopper Class have also explored the solar system and they too went into the planetarium and discovered the theoretical concept of spaghettification. In RE they have been exploring the idea of holiness in Judaism. We had a visit from the Stem Ambassador who helped the children learn more about space. They later designed and built their own rockets and launched them on the playground.




The Festival of Remembrance sub-committee held its first meeting of 2022 on 6th April, arrangements are on course for another successful event.



THE BIG **TEDDY BEAR JUMP**





How do you make a parachute for Teddy ready for the big Jubilee jump?







- Cllr Belson reported that the meeting strongly encouraged by the consultants in their enforced absence did not take place as planned due to technical difficulties with online platform. Three group members did manage to meet but without the rest of the group could not properly start consideration the draft Design Code. This document runs to 95 pages and is full of interesting and helpful guidance on the design of new housing in the context of Walsham le Willows and will provide a much stronger position on the design of housing in the future.
- Cllr Bartholomew asked if policies and a positive statement on the installation of photo-voltaic panels had been included in the design code. Cllr Belson will check this.
- a) Council formally approved the decision indicated by email (24/03/2022) with regard to neighbourhood plan consultancy funding for period of funding gap. Councillors were asked to indicate by email if they wished that the Parish Council directly meet consultancy fees during the funding gap that is created by the return of unspent funds 2021/22 and re-application for funding for 2022/23. The majority of councillors indicated against this provision and for the return and reclaim of the funding to be expedited as quickly as possible to allow consultancy support to the neighbourhood plan group to recommence.
- b) Council approved the return of unspent grant for £5611.50 (as calculated by the Clerk) for 2021/22.
- c) Council approved the application for grant funding of £9,990 for planned work in 2022/23 (£5611.50 plus £4378.50 additional grant) email circulated 08/04/2022
- 10 PLAY AREA DEVELOPMENT to receive report from Cllr Kinnair and consider any matters arising.
 - Cllr Kinnair reported the interest of two more suppliers based in Burnley and Leicester. It is hoped that tenders will be received from these as well as those previously contacted for indicative quotes.
 - It was noted that the closure date for receipt of tenders is 17th April at 17:00; the tenders will be sent to the Clerk who will meet with Cllr Kinnair on 22nd April to document their opening and circulate for consideration ahead of the meeting on 28th April when it is hoped the contract will be awarded.

- direction. Council resolved to defer a decision on this CIL grant request pending the outcome of Cllr Meyer's enquiries.
- d) To receive and consider proposal from Clerk for approval of supply and installation of Four Ashes Finger Post by SCC at an estimated cost of £3,150. Council discussed the information received from the Clerk which indicated only a broad cost range for supply and installation by SCC Highways (effectively the only viable option) and subject to further cost assessments. Given that it is difficult to ascertain the potential additional costs unless the Parish Council undertakes to fund these assessments, which it is thought would highlight the need to move fire hydrant and speed signage, Council determined that value for money could not be reliably established in advance and resolved that this CIL bid request could not be granted.
- e) To consider and approve Clerk's proposal to transfer £55,000 to the deposit account. This was approved along with agreement that the Clerk manage these balances within the £10,000 limit as provided for in the Council's Financial Regulations to maximise the interest from the sums currently held.

FROM ST MARY'S CHURCH

As with every month, during this coming time of May, as we continue through the Easter Season, the Worldwide Christian Church celebrates many Feast Days and Festivals to remember a diverse collections of Christians from throughout the past centuries.

Some were the original disciples, James and Matthias, others were Victorian reformers, such as Josephine Butler, who fought tirelessly for women living in poverty, who had been forced into prostitution. Others celebrated include Bishops and Archbishops, along with Priests and Historians, and the famous hymn writers and Evangelists John and Charles Wesley from the 18th Century. From my own home City the Christian church celebrates the 14th/15th Century Spiritual writer Julian of Norwich, and of course from the same period in history, Joan of Arc.

Also during the month of May, annually, the Church holds its Christian Aid Week; this year from May $22^{nd} - 29^{th}$. Much of this year's focus will of course be upon helping the refugees from Ukraine. Christian Aid estimate that the figure may well be 7.5 million displaced people, the largest wave of European refugees since the Second World War.

Christian Aid is the official relief aid charity for churches across the UK and Ireland, having begun at the end of the Second World War, to offer support to the refugees in Europe. Started by churches of mixed denominations; Catholic, Protestant, Methodist.... Since then it has worked across the world to support sustainable development and provide disaster relief in mainly South America, the Caribbean, Africa and Asia. But Christian Aid works alongside other agencies in many other parts of the world.

Christian Aid Week was launched during the 1950s, and became the largest door to door envelope collection in the UK. At the same time Christian Aid was instrumental in the establishment of the Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO), to enable young people to make a difference, at the same time offering help to churches in countries moving from Colonialism to Independence to meet the needs of poor people.

In the 1960s it was at the forefront in the crisis in Biafra, at the same time standing out vocally against racism, working alongside the UK visit of Martin Luther King.

The 1970s saw Christian Aid develop more of a policy towards educating people about world poverty and the global food crisis. The 1980s saw more of a development in feeding the poor of North Africa and the Ethiopian crisis. 1990s was very much focussed upon the world debt for the Third World Countries, leading to the 2000s when the main (but not only) focus was upon the victims of the Asian Tsunami, in excess of 500,000 people.

Christian Aid continues to help the poorest and most vulnerable across the world. St Mary's Church in Walsham le Willows will be holding a coffee morning and 'Bring and Buy' sale on the morning of Wednesday 18th May at 9.50am directly following the 9.30am church service. All will be most welcome.

WILDLIFE IN MAY

Spring is in full throttle now, with birds singing, making nests, looking after a brood, insects flying around everywhere you look, and animals that were once hibernating are awake once more. Animals such as our hedgehog, who have chucked their pyjamas into a heap and are out and about in the search of food again to build up the fat reserves lost over winter. They will have lost around half their body weight in hibernation, so it is extremely important that they find food. With our seasons behaving erratically with it being hot one minute to the next being rain and gale force winds, food can be hard to come by especially in early spring. There are slugs and snails around but these are not a favourite of hedgehogs, and they will do well to avoid eating these as much as possible, as they carry the Lungworm parasite. Hedgehogs prefer insects such as beetles and grubs and will even eat dead carrion on the sides of the road. You can help these wonderful little creatures by putting out a shallow dish of water, no milk as they are lactose intolerant, and feeding dry/wet meaty cat or dog food. They used to produce a litter in May and one in August, but with our seasons changing some have produced litters back in March, making it a struggle for mum and babies to find enough food. Ones born later in the year will also struggle as the insects die down and the slugs and snails are the only thing to eat, sometimes the Lungworm burden can be too much. If you are worried about a hedgehog you have seen please call a hedgehog rescue to ask their advice. The numbers have been on the rise but they are still classed as an endangered species.

Talking of insects you may be able to see if you are lucky a Lime Hawk Moth. This is one of our best looking moths that can be seen on warm May evenings. It has distinctive scalloped wings and a pattern that is green and chestnut in colour, which is great camouflage against trees or leaves when resting during the day. The Lime Hawk Moth is common in urban areas, parks and gardens. It loves Lime trees hence the name, but it is not the flowers this moth is after, in fact the adults do not feed at all. It is the leaves they are wanting to lay their eggs on. In the absence of Lime trees the moth will go to Elm or London Plane which is an ornamental tree. After some weeks of munching away the caterpillar's which are stripy green and yellow with a blue tail horn will descend to the ground, you can often see them on the ground in leaf litter or on pavements in late summer as they look for a spot to pupate. Once at their chosen spot they will remain until the following May when they will start the cycle again.

Did you know we have a fungi that can freeze solidly, thaw out and continue its growth? This is called the Jelly Ear Fungus. Look out for them in damp, shady conditions growing on decaying wood, particularly on Elder or Beech which they love. This fungus looks very much like a velvety human ear. One of the more common names for this Fungus is the Judas Ear. The name alludes to the fact that the ears mostly appear on Elder, which is the tree Judas hung himself on after the betrayal of Jesus. The legend is that the ears that emerge from the Elder wood represent the tortured soul of Judas!

Touch Wood.

'Touch wood' is an expression that we often hear, it is one of the many superstitious things that people say and do. A person will state something they hope is going to happen to them and they will put their hand on a piece of wood and repeat the words, 'Touch wood', going through a ritual to bring them 'good luck'. The expression originally comes from the idea that there is merit or value in touching the Cross of Christ. Strangely, enough wood supposedly from that cross has been found to make a hundred crosses and more, but it is claimed that to touch the actual wood of the cross that Jesus died upon would find you favour before God and even allow you access to Heaven. The Bible teaches no such thing!

We must always remember that it is the work of the cross that saves a soul, not the wood of the cross. There was nothing special about the wood of the cross that Jesus died upon (that has long since rotted away) but there is something very special about Christ's work.

The work of the cross is the sufferings and death of the Lord Jesus Christ. The Christian church has been remembering the death of Christ upon Calvary's Cross this Easter but, as we do, it is necessary to stress that the death of Christ was a reality. The Lord Jesus did not merely swoon or faint on the cross, He actually died. The Roman centurions were experts in death, and that is why Pilate asked the Roman centurion to confirm that the Lord Jesus was dead – the centurion's testimony settled this question once and for all (Mark 15:44-45).

The great question is why He died on the cross? It was not as a martyr or as a criminal; Jesus died bearing the punishment for our sin. It is important to stress that the Cross-work is central to the Gospel and to our Salvation, and it was completed by the Saviour at Calvary because from the cross He cried, "It is finished". The work is done completely, and it is sufficient; nothing ever needs to be added to it.

The Bible teaches that God's way of Salvation is by simple faith in that finished work. Paul said, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31). If you put your trust only and completely in the finished work of the Saviour, then you will be saved for all eternity.

But now is Christ risen from the dead.

(1 Corinthians 15:20)

COMMUNITY FITNESS CENTRE/GYM

In past surveys of club members and the community, one of the items desired for Walsham has been a gym; now we have a chance of making it happen and we would welcome comments back on what is being proposed:-

Neil Evans has been operating a 'Boot Camp' at the club for the past couple of years with growing success and has now made an approach to us to see if he could operate a gym on our land. The trustees and club management committee are interested but feel that any buildings should be owned by the club with Neil hiring the space, supplying the equipment and growing his business as a fitness trainer in there. The details are still under discussion and quotes for the cost of the building are being sought but it is anticipated that the cost to the club will be in the region of £50,000 for which it is hoped sufficient grants can be secured to make the project viable.

Projected plan:-

- Maximum of 4-5 people using the equipment at any one time
- One -one supervision by Neil for his personal clients (he currently operates in this way in Bury)
- Management of the gym including booking system done by Neil
- It is anticipated a monthly membership will be required for access (rates for Neil's personal clients will be up to him)
- Club and Community membership income will be shared depending on what training input is required from Neil.
- Access will be via coded lock and booking system




