



NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



Police are urging people to be cautious when selling items online to people they don't know, particularly when accepting payment via online transactions.

The appeal comes after two incidents where mobile phones were stolen. Both incidents are believed to involve the same suspect.

A woman had her mobile phone stolen in Stowmarket on 8 February. The woman had agreed to sell the phone to a man, who she did not know, who had contacted her via social media. The man, who visited her home address, showed what she believed to be proof of a financial transaction having taken place, however the money never arrived.

On the same day another woman from Stowupland also had a mobile phone stolen after a man contacted her about the item which was up for sale online. Again, the man showed proof of an online transaction, however payment was never received.

In both instances, after he had left, the victims were blocked on social media by the suspect and therefore unable to make contact to ask about the missing payment.

The man, who gave his name as Jamie, is described as white, with short hair and a stubbly beard. It is believed he was driving an Audi A3.

It is thought other similar thefts may have taken place in the county at around the same time, possibly involving the same suspect. Officers are asking for any victims to come forward.

Members of the public are being urged to be cautious when selling items online and to only hand over items when full payment has been received.

Anyone with any information regarding these or similar incidents is asked to contact Suffolk police quoting reference 37/8453/23.

Police are appealing for information following the theft of diesel from a building site on Old Stowmarket Road, Woolpit.

On two separate occasions between Thursday 9 February and Wednesday 15 February, unknown intruders have broken into the site and stolen approximately 1000 litres of diesel from tanks.

If you have any information about this incident or noticed any suspicious activity in the area, please contact Suffolk police quoting crime reference 37/9275/23.


Each row, column and large square must contain the numbers 1 to 9 inclusive.

CITIZENS ADVICE



My employer asked me to work some extra hours lately, but I don't appear to have received the extra pay. I asked my boss about it and they said they would look into it, but I don't seem to be getting anywhere. What should I do?

If you think your pay is wrong, or you haven't been paid for extra hours worked, the best thing you can do is talk to your employer and find out what's going on. If you and your employer can't agree on how much you should have been paid, you can challenge them. You should act quickly though – it'll be harder to get your money after 3 months from the date the problem arose.

You should start by checking your payslip if you've got one. This will help you see how your pay has been worked out. Check things like:

- Whether you've been paid for the number of hours you've actually worked
- If you've been paid at the correct rate
- If you've been paid overtime, a commission or a bonus
- Whether you've been paid any sick pay
- If your employer has deducted any money that you weren't expecting

Ask your employer to explain anything you don't understand on your payslip or why you haven't been paid what you believe you are owed. If you disagree with anything, explain why. If your employer has made a genuine mistake, ask them to pay you the money you're owed straight away – you should not have to wait until your next pay day. If you need more help, you can contact Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk to get advice on the next steps.

In A Beautiful Balloon Well not quite!!!







Come along to the Focus Group and have your say! Everyone welcome. We hope to see you there.





Gardens Weekend 2022

The Gardens Weekend event in 2022 was an overwhelming success and generated just over £18,000 for village causes, including £9,000 towards the fabric of St. Mary's church.

This amazing result is thanks to the owners who generously opened their beautiful gardens, plus the overwhelming support across the village, without which this event could not take place.

We received six bids for funding and the following grants have been approved:

- Walsham History Group £349 for a portable PA system.
- Walsham le Willows CEVC Primary School £800 to fund their Emotional Literacy Support Assistant Project.
- Walsham le Willows Wild Wood £2,000 towards legal costs, additional rent, timber for a new bridge and plant spirals for the new Jubilee Wood.
- Walsham Arts & Crafts Group and the Priory Room £1,362 for new picture hanging system and spot lighting.
- Walsham le Willows Sports Club £2,000 towards costs for a new Community Gym.
- Walsham le Willows Allotment and Leisure Gardeners Association £1,720 for new sheds, water butts etc.

Those members of the Committee with an interest in various applications took no part in the relevant decisions.





WALSHAM LE WILLOWS PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

of the meeting held on Wednesday 8th February 2023 commencing at 7.00 p.m. in the Memorial Hall.

[Pending formal approval, these minutes have been informally approved. Any further corrections will be proposed & minuted at the next meeting]

PRESENT: Cllrs. Arbon Bartholomew, Belson, Kinnair, Mecrow, Roberts and Winch.

ALSO PRESENT: County Councillor Jessica Fleming, District Councillor Rick Meyer

- 1. OPENING including Statement, if any
- 2. APOLOGIES None received.
- 3. DECLARATIONS of Pecuniary & Non-Pecuniary Interests
 - a) To receive declarations of pecuniary, local non-pecuniary interest(s) incl. personal interests in items on the agenda and to include declarations of any gifts of hospitality None received.
 - b) To receive declarations of lobbying for planning matters on the agenda none were requested.
 - c) To receive requests for dispensations None requested
- 4. MINUTES Minutes for meeting of 11th January 2022, as previously circulated, were approved along with consent for the Chair to sign the minutes as a true and accurate record.
- 5. REPORTS FOR INFORMATION & QUESTIONS to receive written reports & put questions:
 - The Chair invited questions to County Councillor Fleming. Cllr Fleming advised that the adult social care provision makes up 2/3rd of the whole budget. She also confirmed to Cllr Winch that she would not support cuts to library services and that Community Action Suffolk and Highways budgets were being increased. Cllr Belson asked about progress on the Palmer Street road safety issues. Cllr Fleming confirmed that this had been discussed in detail with Catherine Davies and this is on the radar as part of the local cycling and infrastructure project for assessment and evaluation, but this is not something that is going to happen quickly as all highways projects take a long time to come to fruition. Cllr Fleming confirmed that one finger post had now been reinstated and the other would be replaced soon with support from her highways budget. Cllr Bartholomew asked about changes to the highways contract. Cllr Fleming advised that this will be a partnership between a contractor and highways. It was asked how this is going to work any better, but Cllr Fleming was unable to give any detail at this stage on how it is proposed to work in practice. The proposal is being examined by the scrutiny committee for best value and the public are invited to ask questions as part of this process. Cllr Fleming would welcome that input. Cllr Fleming reported that the Stanton

- development has been discussed at Botesdale and Rickinghall along with concerns about the protection of the quality of chalk groundwater sources of drinking water which are already affected by agricultural pollution.
- The Chair invited questions to District Councillor Meyer. He reported the budget is looking good with council tax frozen for 2023/24 but rents are going up. He explained that the general and housing revenue budgets have to be kept separate. The law requires this so there can be no cross subsidy and that although rents are increasing, anyone in social housing on housing benefit will not pay their own rent. In context of proposal to encourage more people to get involved as Parish Councillors, Cllr Meyer noted that the closing date for the submission of election nominations was 4pm on 4th April. Cllr Kinnair made a point about requirement for photo proof for elections will potentially disenfranchise some people and asked about publicity arrangements about valid id and the process for obtaining valid id. Clerk to publicise information locally.
- 6. PUBLIC FORUM No members of the public were present.
- 7. PLANNING MATTERS
 - a) DC/22/2190/HYB Consultation on application received by West Suffolk Council Local Planning Authority Proposal Hybrid planning application. This was discussed and it was agreed that the report received from the consultant should be approved and submitted to West Suffolk with minor amendments made in the meeting. Parish Council Objected
 - b) Council unanimously approved the decision confirmed by email because of time constraints, of discussions to engage consultant (at capped cost of £1500) to advise on objections against DC/22/2190/HYB with reference to NPPF.
- 8. PLANNING OUTCOMES (decided by Mid Suffolk District Council, Planning Authority) for noting only
 - a) Application Reference: DC/22/06058: Proposal: Householder Application Erection of a single storey extension to side and rear (following demolition of flat roof side element). Replace windows and doors and alterations to fenestration and all associated works. Location: The Bungalow, West Street Farm, West Street, Walsham Le Willows Bury St Edmunds Suffolk IP31 3AP MSDC Has Granted Permission
 - b) Application Reference: DC/22/05544 Proposal Householder application Erection of single storey rear extension Location: Fairfield House, 3 Postmill Gardens, Walsham Le Willows, Bury St Edmunds Suffolk IP31 3DZ MSDC Has Granted Permission
- 9. NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN
 - Cllr Belson reported that there has been no meeting since the last PC meeting but that he is due to meet with consultant (over Zoom) to agree corrections to draft plan.
- 10. PLAY AREA DEVELOPMENT to receive report from Cllr Kinnair and consider any matters arising.
 - a) The Parish Council agree proposals circulated by Cllrs Kinnair and Belson for addressing outstanding tasks at the Play Area. Cllr Kinnair confirmed that the proposal addressed all the items that had been noted on the action plan. This

- was unanimously approved. Cllr Belson confirmed that some tasks had already been completed. Clerk to update the action log as evidence as that these are being addressed.
- b) Exact plans for celebration day in the spring were postponed until next meeting but based on the circulated quote the Clerk was asked to order the three bench seats (at £346 each plus vat) from Clarkes along with some chains to secure these and 6 bags of post mix.
- c) The proposed layout and wording for the new signage was approved. Clerk and Cllr Winch to work on this and place order as soon as the image from local school children has been agreed. It was agreed that the Clerk should seek permission to use the logos of the organisations that contributed to funding.

11. FINANCE & AUDIT

- a) The bank reconciliation for period ending 31st January 2022 was approved and signed.
- b) Accounts awaiting payment (Appendix 1) were approved and signed for submission.
- c) The request from the PCC to amend the work to be completed that was subject of the previously approved CIL bid. The Parish Council decided that there were no objections to this proposal. The amount of the CIL award that will be paid on receipt of invoices, remains unchanged. Clerk to respond.
- d) Cllrs Roberts & Winch agreed to complete the Internal Control Check reports for December (3rd quarter) and March (4th quarter). Clerk to circulate proforma to both councillors for reporting to the March meeting for approval.

12. CLERK & COUNCILLOR REPORTS

- a) The meeting reviewed the action log.
- a. Cllr Mecrow offered to pay a visit to the Lovell's site office to try to establish agreement to a site meeting once hedge planting and remaining works are complete but before the contractors leave the site.
- b. The Clerk was asked to circulate the required documentation for the spring litter pick. To Cllrs Mecrow & Roberts for action. Date was set for 11/12th March.
- b) Cllr Roberts confirmed that SID Solar Panel for Summer Road Speed indicator device had been delivered to site and installed and was in operation.
- c) Cllr Arbon had advised that cost estimate for alternative arrangements for Fishponds Lane access had not yet been obtained. This will be obtained for the next meeting.
- d) The Clerk referred to the response from Norfolk & Suffolk Constabulary. Unfortunately, the speed gun is not of a make which is currently recommended for use by them and the Community Speed Watch groups they oversee. Clerk & Cllr Roberts to arrange for disposal.
- a. The Clerk presented two estimates for new shed, and advised that the Community Council had agreed to the siting of a new shed on the base located at the Memorial Hall. The Clerk was asked to get another quote.
- e) The proposal by the Clerk to hold the September meeting 6th rather than 13th (first Wednesday rather than second Wednesday) was unanimously approved. It was confirmed that the Community Council agreed to swap their meeting date as well.

- f) The Clerk asked for approval to dispose of the old inkjet printer and remaining inks within the village to an organisation that might want this. Unanimously agreed.
- g) Council considered the correspondence from resident following pruning & pollarding of trees on Swan path by UK Power Networks. They had been asked to attend to a hanging branch in a different location whilst they were there and refused. The resident asked if the Parish Council could attend to this which will require a cherry picker and so incur some considerable cost. It was decided that this was not the responsibility of the Parish Council. Clerk to respond.
- h) Cllr Winch proposed the Parish Council publicise May Elections inviting people to put their names forward. Unanimously agreed. Cllr Winch to forward link to Clerk.
- i) The Clerk proposed the closure of the email inboxes currently used for Neighbourhood Plan and the Parish Council Website on the Parish Council domain, and routing these to the Parish Clerk email address. This was unanimously agreed.
- j) The chair called for any other matters of concern/note. It was noted that a large build up aggregate, bricks and other items has been noticed on the R&D site on Summer Road. The Clerk was asked to investigate.

FROM ST MARY'S CHURCH

Amongst the many Christian Churches festivals and feast days during March, two of our Patron Saints are remembered. On the first of the month St David, Patron Saint of Wales, and upon the 17th of the month, perhaps rather more well known, St Patrick, Patron Saint of Ireland.

St David was both a monk and a Bishop during the 6th Century, and founded the monastery at Menevia, now called St David's. The original monastic buildings have gone, and today there stands a Cathedral which is 12th Century, with much rebuilding added during the following centuries. During his lifetime David was highly regarded not just for his spiritual life, but especially for his kindness and compassion to others, notably the poor and the sick.


St Patrick was born in the last 4th Century, and tradition has it that at an early age he was taken from his home town of Carlisle to be a slave in Ireland. Having escaped slavery, Patrick travelled to Europe, and was Ordained as a Priest, finally returning to Ireland as a Bishop, making his base at Armagh. Despite fierce opposition and even persecution, David continued to preach the Christian Faith. Irish Christians today, of all traditions, equally identify with St Patrick and draw inspiration from his life.

Later in the month, on the 24th, the Worldwide Church remembers a rather more recent Saint, and perhaps less well known; Oscar Romero.

Born in humble circumstances in El Salvador in 1917, as a young man he became Ordained as a Christian Priest. He was known to be quiet and unassuming, and yet in 1977, amongst the political upheaval and violence of his country, was appointed as its Archbishop. Most of the country was in poverty and a corrupt Government kept it that way with mass abduction, torture and death squads. Courageously however, Oscar began to speak out against violence and human rights abuse. His homilies, sermons, writings and radio broadcasts supported the demands of the poor for economic and social justice.

He refused to be silenced, and continued to preach even under threat of assassination. During his three years as Archbishop, six of his Priests were murdered. Inevitably, whilst presiding at Mass in March 1980, Archbishop Romero was assassinated, by a supposedly lone gunman, but undoubtedly sponsored by a violent regime. In 2018, recognising the Archbishop as 'a martyr for the faith,' Pope Francis canonised Oscar Romero as a Saint. For the occasion the Pope wore the same blood-stained belt that Romero was wearing at the altar when he was murdered.

WILDLIFE IN MARCH

This is the month for the Spring Equinox, which will be on March the 20th. The warmer weather is now getting ever nearer and we are thinking ahead for what we would like for our gardens and allotments.


Insects and Mammals are starting to stir and warm themselves in the sun. One of these insects is the Butterfly. The first ones to emerge are the Commas, Peacocks and the Small Tortoishell, after hibernating as adults through the winter. All it takes in a small rise in air for these insects to awake from their winter slumber. The nectar from which they feed off is quite limited at this time of the year, but Primroses and Catkins are a favourite choice. Look out for these Butterflies basking in the sun on the barks of trees or even the posts in our gardens.

There is an amphibian that is also starting to stir as the weather warms up. This is the Toad. They are getting ready to breed and unlike Frogs they will visit the water only to breed. This migration will happen on masse and is called the 'big push' as so many move together. This will normally happen on damp, drizzly evenings when the temperature is around 7-8 degrees Celsius. Unfortunately for the Toads this 'big push' happens in the evening when the rush hour traffic hits, a lot of Toads will not make it. So how did the Toad cross the road? Well they are scooped into a bucket and put safely across as there are organised efforts to help these poor creatures called Toad watch or Toad patrol which help them cross the road safely.

Now we move away from our warty friends and find another nocturnal prickly little fellow, the Hedgehog. Hedgehogs are now waking up from their hibernation, usually when the temperature reaches 10 degrees Celsius. These endangered mammals need all the help they can get as hibernating through the winter will have taken its toll. The will have lost around half or more of their body weight at this point and will be on the look out for food to build up their fat reserves once again. Insects at this point will not be in abundance so you can help by placing a shallow bowl of water out, not milk as they are lactose intolerant. A dish of cat or dog food is always a favourite, but go for the meaty varieties as the fish ones can make them unwell, alternatively you can buy hedgehog food. Do this and you may have a prickly visitor very soon!

Birds are busy this time of the year, calling out territories and collecting nesting material. Why not put up a few bird boxes in your garden. Open fronted boxes will attract Wrens and Robins, these need to be lower to the ground, below 2m and hidden in vegetation. Woodpeckers need their boxes to be 3-5 meters high, on a trunk of a tree, with a clear flight path with least disturbance as possible. For Blue Tits, Sparrows and Starlings, the nesting box is best placed 2-4 meters high. It is best to place nesting boxes facing North or East, or even better a little between. This will give your birds and their babies the best protection from the sun, wind and rain. Fingers crossed you will hear their little cheeps soon!

STRESS FREE GARDENING

A course designed to lower stress levels is soon to be launched at an historic walled garden in Suffolk.

It is particularly to benefit people aged 18 to 75, suffering mental health issues such as anxiety, depression, loneliness, grief, and social isolation.

'Let It Grow' is a relaxed and therapeutic approach to learning the basics about horticulture and the Environment.

It is being pioneered by the recently established Community Interest Company, Wild Heritage Suffolk, which is based at

the four acre site on the **Langham** estate. Dating back around 300 years, the walled garden includes a restored kitchen garden and orchards and a

wildlife rich meadow. There is also a plant nursery, specialising in native wildflowers, heritage vegetables, herbs and ornamental plants,

plus a small shop selling plants and organic produce to the public.

The project is set to start on 2nd May and will operate with two half day sessions weekly on Tuesdays through until late September.

Priority booking for the scheme is being given to participants who are referred by NHS Social Prescribers via the LifeLink organisation

or those based at GP surgeries in Ixworth, Stanton, Woolpit and Botesdale.

There are 20 places available and no qualifications are required. The sessions are **free of charge**, with tools and materials all supplied.

Those joining the course can expect to divide their time between the new covered customised education space, lean-to-greenhouse and adapted raised beds, all made possible by funding from Suffolk Community Foundation (Pargiter Fund and Frank Jackson Foundation). The mix of indoor and outdoor activity led

by a qualified instructor, will involve 'getting your hands dirty' and achieving the satisfaction of growing seasonal plants, vegetables and salad to take home.

Wild Heritage Suffolk director and walled garden manager Catherine Supple explains: "The atmosphere in the walled garden is very special. Once you come through the gate in the wall you are entering a very calm and serene place where all you can hear is bird song. It's a perfect place to relax and feel away from life's pressures. We want participants to come here to gain confidence, learn new skills, develop existing skills, get stuck in to the soil and above all, feel free to socialise.

"The sessions will be based around all aspects of growing, gardening, pollination, organic and sustainable living, and the importance of wildlife and biodiversity. We are developing a list of core seasonal subjects and workshops that we feel will benefit both those taking part and the natural environment. We hope to provide transport where it is required."

Those interested in taking part should contact either LifeLink or an NHS Social Prescriber at their local GP surgery.

The catchment area is villages and the towns of Bury St. Edmunds and Stowmarket.


Foggy, being the youngster in the group, strolled behind them with his head in the air

Wasted Warnings

In the year 44 BC, on the 15th of March, Julius Caesar died. This great leader of the mighty Roman Empire didn't die in battle, or at the hands of his enemies, but was assassinated in the supposed safety of the very heart of Rome, at the treacherous hands of some of the leading politicians of the day. What had transpired was that sixty or so of his Senators had conspired in a murderous plot against him, including many close friends and advisors. They inflicted twenty-three vicious stab wounds upon the surrounded Ceaser, one of which, according to the earliest known post-mortem report in history, proved fatal.

In many ways the death of Julius Caeser could have been avoided. Apparently, he had heard rumours of the plot that were circulating through Rome at the time, friends had come to warn him, and his wife Calpurnia had even suffered nightmares of his death so, that fateful day, pleaded with her husband not to leave the house, but all to no avail!

We could well say that Caesar was most foolish not to listen to the warnings that had been given him, however, we must not be too quick to pass judgement. There may have been many warnings that we have been given in our own lives that it would have been wise to have heeded for our physical wellbeing but, far more importantly, what of the warnings we have received regarding the safety of the soul, or being eternally lost?

God is very gracious as He patiently warns people throughout their lives of the peril that lies ahead. Natural disasters are a reminder that this world will come to an end, illness and disease remind us of our own mortality; the wonders of creation declare the existence of the Sovereign God, but the conscience warns that we are sinners in His sight and confirms that no amount of effort, sacrifice or good works can make us fit to be in His presence. The Bible soberly warns that "we shall all stand before the judgement seat of Christ" (Romans 14:10). CAKES FROM AROUND THE COUNTRY

Banbury Cakes

450gm prepared puff pastry 60gm butter, melted 120gm raisins 120gm currants 60gm mixed peel 120gm demerara sugar 1 level tsp mixed spice Egg white and caster sugar, for topping

Set oven to 220°C or Mark 7. Mix the melted butter, fruit, peel, sugar and spice together in a bowl, combining well. Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface and, using a saucer, cut into about 16 circles. Divide the fruit mixture evenly between them, then dampen the edges of the pastry circles and draw up into the centre, sealing well. Turn over and, with the hands, gently form the cakes into ovals, then press down very gently with a rolling pin. Make 3 diagonal cuts across the top of each cake, then brush with egg white and sprinkle with sugar. Place on lightly greased baking trays and bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden. Serve lightly warm. Makes about 16 cakes.

Coventry Godcakes

240gm prepared puff pastry 2 tsps. Rum (optional)

120gm mincemeat 1 egg white

Caster sugar

Set oven to 220°C or Mark 7. Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface and cut into 4 inch squares, then cut each square in half on the diagonal to make two triangles. Mix the mincemeat with the rum, if desired, and place spoonfuls on half of the triangles. Cover each one with another triangle, moistening the edges with a little water and pressing down firmly to seal. Beat the egg white lightly. Cut three slits in each cake with a very sharp knife, then brush with egg white. Sprinkle with caster sugar and place on a greased baking sheet. Bake for 15 minutes or until well risen and golden. Cool on a wire rack and east as fresh as possible.

Penzance Cake

450gm self raising flor60gm chopped mixed peelPinch of salt90gm stem ginger, finely chopped2tsps ground cinnamon3 large eggs, beaten120gm butter, softened90mls clear honey, warmed450gm currants90mls milk, warmed

Set oven to 180°C or Mark 4. Grease and line a 20cm round cake tin. Sift the flour, salt and cinnamon together into a owl and rub in the butter until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Stir in currants, mixed peel and stem ginger. Warm the honey and milk together. Add the beaten eggs to the bowl and then mix in with sufficient of the honey/milk mixture and produce a soft but not sticky dough. Put into the tin and bake for 1 to 1½ hours until a skewer inserted comes out clean. Leave to cool in the tin.






