





WALSHAM HISTORY GROUP

The Anti-Terrorist Branch A talk by Paul Jordan

Wednesday 17th March saw a great turnout of well over 60 members and guests who came to listen to Paul Jordan, a retired forensics officer with the Metropolitan police talk about his life's work with Scotland Yard, concentrating on his time in forensics and the anti-terrorist branch. Paul was joined by Ian McCloud, who worked alongside him for many years. Ian served for over 28 years; the majority of this time spent as a detective.

The talk covered a broad span of activities, including forensic training and covet operations to name but two.

Over the years, Paul, Ian, and their colleagues showing amazing tenacity and bravery, in keeping London and its people safe. We were given a rare insight from the people who were there, a chance to see into the background of famous cases that made headline news and that many of us remember.

We learnt about the Harrods and the Brighton bombings, and the many hours of painstaking forensic and detective work needed to try and bring the perpetrators to justice. In the case of the Grand Hotel in Brighton, the blast brought down a five-ton chimney stack, which crashed down through the floors and into the basement, leaving a gaping hole in the hotel's façade. With all this devastation an expert could still identify exactly where the blast originated. Sadly 6 people lost their lives and a number suffered permanent damage from their injuries.

A potential plane bombing connected to the middle east was stopped by careful surveillance and much hard work, thereby saving many innocent lives. People who had lost their lives, while just going about their daily business were remembered, as were members of the police force. Through the undoubted high stress and strain these jobs hold, despite the terrorists attempts to confuse the police and cause as much human hurt as possible, we know that these brave officers never gave up the fight, and that this attitude and bravery continues to this day.



PÉTANQUE IS NOW HERE!



The draft Neighbourhood Plan incorporates the 2022 settlement boundary which is expected to replace the existing 1998 settlement boundary in the forthcoming revisions to Stage II of the BMSDC Local Plan.

The application was very well received by the Parish Council in terms of the proposed scale and its close adherence to the design codes and policies as well as the responses by Sam Stonehouse (Evolution Planning) to questions posed by Parish Councillors. 

- Although the attention to design and scale met with much approval, the application goes against the spirit and intention of the draft Neighbourhood Plan in its entirety.
- The Parish Council is satisfied that the Broad Meadow site for which a planning application has been approved, will provide much needed affordable housing.
- Although not a valid basis for objections to housing development, the Neighbourhood Plan consultation exercises noted a strong sentiment against excessive or inappropriate development.
- BMSDC has advised that they have a 10-year housing supply (against a current requirement for 5 years) and Walsham has already met its quota within that requirement via the Wattisfield Road developments and other smaller infill developments.
- This development would further link Four Ashes and the rest of the village which would impact on the separate character of the two distinct areas. Maintaining these distinct areas was one of the purposes of redefining the settlement boundary in 2022.
- 12. PLANNING OUTCOMES (decided by Mid Suffolk District Council, Planning Authority) for noting only None

- 13. NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN to receive any comments from Parish Council representatives (Cllrs. Belson & Mecrow) and consider any matters arising

The King & The King of Kings

We have recently witnessed the great spectacle of the Coronation of King Charles III. As Charles was anointed with oil, the words of that great coronation anthem of George Frideric Handle, 'Zadok the Priest' sounded out, "God save the King, long live the King, may the King live for ever".

However, in 1741 Handle composed his great and most enduring work, 'Messiah', not about the anointing of an earthly king but proclaiming the 'Anointed One'- the Messiah - the Lord Jesus Christ – the KING OF KINGS.' Handle was a Christian and he understood that just as we are subject to earthly kings and rulers, everyone, whether king or commoner is subject to King of Kings who will truly reign for ever and ever. The guests in Westminster Abbey may have curtseyed or bowed before Charles, but the Bible declares that one day everyone who has ever lived will bow before the Lord Jesus Christ: "That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow...and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10-11)

Therefore, no matter if our personal inclinations are monarchist or republican relating to earthly rule, the ultimate question for us all must be, how shall we fair on that great and final day of this world's history when every knee shall bow before Jesus Christ? 

- different to how it was done for 2022/23 and that they needed to be completed in a timely manner as allocated. The Clerk may decide to issue them all at once so that those councillors allocated have nearly a whole year to complete as and when suits them.
- d) Council considered guidance on Spring Litter Picks and how picking not completed as part of a Parish Council organised group/day will be handled in respect of Parish Council risk assessments and insurance cover. It was decided to ask the Clerk to contact the insurance company for advice after which the risk assessment may need to be revised. Cllr Mecrow agreed to work with Cllr Roberts to reallocate areas against current volunteers, establish vacant areas ready for a drive to attract more volunteers possibly with flexibility to carry out pick over a week at time of their choosing. They would be allowed to keep the kit issued from year to year until they 'resigned'. FROM ST MARY'S

Throughout England you are never far from a Christian Church of one period in history or another, very often churches which would be loosely described as 'Medieval.' Indeed we have six within our own Benefice; as well as two more recently built Chapels. They give a somewhat obvious indication of the importance placed upon Christianity within our nation down through the ages. At the same time there are also forty-two Cathedrals upon mainland England, based in each Diocese as the Primary Church of the Bishop.

Recently I was fortunate to visit one of these fine buildings; Carlisle Cathedral. The second smallest of all the Cathedrals. It began life in 1122 as a Priory or Monastic Church dedicated as our church in Walsham is, to St Mary. Unusual in being the only medieval monastic Cathedral of the Augustinian Order of Monks. By 1133 the area, being close to the Scottish border, had become so unruly that Henry I decided that he needed to impose his authority. The King duly created a new Diocese, with Carlisle at its centre, and the church became a cathedral to symbolise the authority which henry wished to show. The first Bishop to be appointed was an Englishman, Athelwold, previously the Prior.

During these last nine hundred years the Cathedral has seen its fair share of turbulence, which has been a direct result of being so close to the Borderlands. During the English Civil War much of the Cathedral Nave was demolished by the Scottish Presbyterian Army in order to use the stone to reinforce Carlisle Castle. A Century later the Cathedral was used as a prison to house Jacobite prisoners from the 1745 uprising.

As with most churches and Cathedrals, Carlisle Cathedral has seen its fair share of refurbishment, periodically changing its style, not always intentional. In 1292 part of the Cathedral was severely damaged by a city-wide fire, caused by a young man called Simon of Orton, disgruntled at his inheritance (or rather lack of).

With the Dissolution of the Monasteries from 1536, and the establishment of Henry VIII as Head of the Church, the monastic Cathedrals were dissolved to be run by a secular chapter. However good evidence of the former monastery remains intact, enough to give a genuine feel for the atmosphere pre-Dissolution.

The Cathedral especially focuses upon the lives of St Anthony of Egypt, the founder of monasticism, St Augustine, the founder of the Augustinian Order and from Northumberland St Cuthbert of Lindisfarne. The cathedral is rich in carvings, paintings, an impressive Treasury collection, and a stained-glass East Window which is one of the tallest in England. Entrance is free, (donations gratefully received), and a visit is certainly worthwhile.

WILDLIFE IN JUNE

Plants are coming into flower, hedgerows and trees are thick with leaves and animals are at full activity once again. June is a very busy time for one of our birds of prey, the Sparrowhawk. These birds are now widespread and a common sight, but a few decades ago were almost extinct due to persecution and pesticides. June is a very busy month for them as this is the month when their first chicks hatch. They prefer dense wooded areas to build their nests and they will lay around 3-6 eggs. Their breeding seasons are timed perfectly by them as this is the time when food, weather dependent is in abundance. The timing is to do with the songbirds, newly fledged and young birds are inexperienced with flying and to the dangers around them, and make easy prey for the Sparrowhawk to hunt to feed their chicks. Breeding and rearing success in June is very dependent on how the songbirds rearing success went in earlier months. In 2021 the cold and wet spring adversely affected the songbirds and the Sparrowhawk had a hard year. So, they only do well if their prey does too. Male chicks will fledge the nest at round 26 days old and females at day 30. They will remain in the vicinity for another 3-4 weeks after fledging with care from the parents.

Unlike the Sparrowhawk that we see often, there is a mysterious mammal that is a rare sight, the Water Shrew. It is not to be mistaken for the Water Vole. This little Shrew looks more like a mole with a more pointy nose, is black on top and a silvery grey underneath. They have adapted to aquatic life very well, they have thick fur to aid buoyancy, a hairy tail and, although they do not have webbed feet, they do have stiff hair on their toes which aids swimming. They live in burrows along the banksides of very well vegetated ponds, streams and ditches, making them very hard to spot. Many reports of them come from their high-pitched squeaks being picked up on bat detectors. June is the month that these Water Shrews start giving birth and this will continue throughout summer. The female will give birth in the burrow and will have around 3-15 young per litter. The adults have a very short lifespan of around 1-2 years only. They are carnivorous, and their red tipped teeth are strengthened with iron. An interesting fact about these small mammals is that they have venomous saliva which is potent enough to subdue small fish and frogs!

You do not have to venture far to see wildlife, it is all around us if we stop for a few moments to watch and listen. Our gardens are now springing back to life with more colour and there are visitors lurking in the undergrowth. One of these is the Black Slug. A lot of gardeners will quickly get rid of these pests straight away, but are they really a pest? Only a quarter of our 40 species of slugs actually eat our plants, so what is the Black Slug feeding on? They eat decaying material and much prefer a compost heap. By recycling these decaying plant matters and turning them into nutrients they play a very important role in the ecosystem. They are called Black Slugs but some can be orange to brown in colour with a frilly orange skirt. They have been on this planet a long time, around 150 million years, so if you come across one perhaps admire and watch for a few moments and think these are a gardener's friend.

Wood Burners

Are They Bad for The Environment?

I'm writing this in May as hopefully no one is still using their wood burner!

Roughly 8% of homes in the UK have a wood burner and I confess that I am one of them. I like the focal point in the room, the flicker of the fire and the blast of heat on a freezing day. I am also attracted to the idea that if the electricity is cut off I would still be able to heat my home without relying on anyone else.

The trouble is that there is now increasing evidence that wood burners are bad for the environment. The main pollutant emitted by burning solid fuels like wood is ultra-fine particulate matter, also known as PM2.5. The toxins get lodged in the brain, heart and lungs. It is widely acknowledged as being the air pollutant which has the greatest impact on human health impacting respiratory and cardiovascular diseases as well as leading to asthma in the young and dementia in the elderly.

The overall scale of the impact of wood burners is hard to get your head round. Research suggests domestic wood burners produce more small particle pollution than all road traffic in the UK. The problem has also increased significantly since 2010.


So where are we heading on this?

The first step was the "eco design" standard which enables an 80% reduction in particulate emissions. However, even wood-burning stoves meeting the new standard still emit 750 times more tiny particles than a modern HGV truck.

Is the next step going to be an end to the sale of wood burners, the compulsory registration of existing wood burners, followed by a ban on their use? In London wood burners are effectively already banned in new and refurbished buildings as the impact of a wood burner would exceed the air pollution limits.

So, if you already have a wood burner what should you do? There are three obvious measures. Firstly, get your wood burner checked so you can see how eco efficient it is and act accordingly. Secondly, ensure any logs you use have a maximum moisture content of 20% (they should ideally be kiln dried). Before use, you should bring the logs inside at least 24 hours before burning. Finally, there is no getting away from the obvious. The way forward is to reduce the amount you use the wood burner. This means maybe just using the wood burner for special occasions or when it's really needed.




