

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# **SUMMER ROAD ACCIDENT**

#### From Ian Campbell

Highlighted within the Neighbourhood Plan was the issue of heavy vehicle traffic in Summer Rd being a narrow road with no footpath which is of worry to the Sports Club particularly in view of the number of youngsters who access the site on bikes and as pedestrians. Suffolk County Council have been engaged with this issue and although sympathetic and identified as needing to have a resolution, we again witness in the photo, further evidence of the problems caused as a lorry is recovered from the ditch on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> February 2024. There simply isn't room for two lorries to pass at certain points and allied to the sodden verges and flooded roads due to drain and ditches not cleaned out, this is the sort of result.

Sadly, a young driver lost his life further up the Summer Road in the last couple of weeks and although the cause of that accident may have nothing to do with the road conditions, it is a further worry.

#### From Jessica Fleming (County Councillor)

Your points concerning the dangers to users of the sports facilities from road traffic are well made. I would be happy to meet with you to discuss possible approaches for reducing risk in this area, construction of a walking route between the sports facilities and town centre as part of the LCWIP programme will greatly enhance safety when achieved however I understand that this is a slow process. Given plans for expansion at the Stanton industrial site the importance of controlling traffic around Walsham gains additional importance and can best be achieved through active participation in these planning decisions.

#### From Richard Winch (Mid-Suffolk District Councillor)

This is last reply I received from SCC just before Christmas - "With regards to Summer Road that hasn't progressed as it isn't feasible to accommodate a route in the highway verge, we haven't had the opportunity to explore any creation on private land yet but will review that in the new year."

I think a meet up would be good and we could walk the route from the village.

I am trying to get the Sustainable Travel Officer from Mid Suffolk to join us as I think there maybe be elements of the plan that Mid Suffolk could help us with directly - otherwise I fear that given all the cost constraints at SCC it is unlikely to happen.

#### From Richard Martineau

I tried to get Cayzer trustees to give a strip of their field opposite Mrs Williamson's house to provide for a footpath and I would give a similar strip in my field below the southern Summer Road Cottage. (This was soon after I had given a strip to allow for a footpath to the bridge on the cemetery bend.) One person had already been run over there.

I would still be happy to offer a strip of my field and I think that if the ditch in front of the northern Summer Road cottages were piped there would be space for a footpath above. I do hope something gets done this time

#### From Katherine Davies (Sustainable Travel Officer Mid-Suffolk District Council)

We would like to arrange a site visit so that local stakeholders (including representatives from the sports club and the community traffic group) and Cllrs from parish, district and county can discuss the issues with relevant colleagues from Suffolk County Council highways and Public Rights of Way, and we can start to develop ideas for interventions and funding.

We are looking to schedule this site visit for the week commencing Monday 4<sup>th</sup> March,

This half term will see us celebrating World Book Day, Science Week and Red Nose Day so we have been busy in all areas of the curriculum and raising money and awareness for these charities and good causes. We also wore t-shirts to celebrate NSPCC Number Day and raised over £60, which is an incredible amount.

Our theme for Collective Worship next half term is 'Hope' and we have been looking at how we can be hopeful in different situations as we lead into Easter.



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# CITIZENS ADVICE



Damp and mould is building up in our house as the weather gets colder. Our living room is the worst and there's a strong smell, so we've stopped having friends round. We're also concerned about our health. We've reported it to our landlord, but they haven't done anything. With six months left on the tenancy agreement, we're running out of options. What should we do?

You've done the right thing by bringing this to your landlord. To work out if they are responsible, you'll need to find the cause of the damp and mould. This can take time unless there's a clear cause, like bad insulation or a leaking roof.

Damp is when an area of your property doesn't dry out, often because it's cold. The main types are rising, penetrating, construction, and condensation damp. It can lead to mould, which is a fungus that grows in areas where warm damp air condenses on cold surfaces, like window frames. Information on our website can help you work out what type of damp you have, who is responsible and what you can do. Go to citizensadvice.org.uk and search damp for more information.


You should check your tenancy agreement for mentions of repairs and damp. Your landlord is responsible for fixing a damp problem if it's making your home unsafe to live in. For example, this could be if it's affecting your health or the health of those you live with. Your landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, like if the window frames are rotting.

Condensation is a key cause of damp we're all familiar with. You should try and reduce extra moisture in your home, this will make it easier to show that your landlord is responsible for the damp. Extra moisture can come from portable gas or paraffin heaters, drying wet clothes or using a tumble dryer with no outside vent.

You may reach the point where you just want to get out of your tenancy agreement early, but remember this can be tricky and there might be things you haven't tried yet.

For example, you could get support from Safe Suffolk Renters, a Suffolk wide project to help improve relationships between landlords and private tenants. Contact them via their website safesuffolkrenters.org. As a private renter, if you've got evidence from a health professional that damp is making you ill, you may be able to get free legal advice through Legal Aid.

Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can provide in depth advice on this issue and much more, including debt, finances, employment, benefits and family/relationships. 

# THOUGHTS FROM THE WILD WOODS

- Elsewhere readers will see a report on our curry evening with Patrick Barker who certainly provided food for thought. A few of them:
- They are experimenting with 'leaky dams' on streams to reduce downstream flooding, might we consider this in Walsham..?.
- Working with government and other agencies they take full advantage of grants, initiatives and subsidies. On a 35 acre farm, as part of a Government Stewardship Scheme, they grow no crops for the market but, with some voluntary community involvement, it remains a viable enterprise benefiting the whole area attracting rare and endangered species to its green and pleasant spaces. Simply looking after the land and the environment can provide an income for land owners.....interesting?
- They are in the vanguard of an ever growing movement in the farming world that seeks to work towards a truly sustainable way of producing crops and animals. Twenty years ago they would have been thought of as outliers now they are part of a commercial regenerative farming resurgence which can surely be replicated.
- Our own local efforts in creating community wild spaces are a mere pin prick in terms of saving the planet but, they are a start, and they point in the same direction that people like Patrick are moving.
- If we can change the way the land is managed on our doorstep then we can really make a difference. If we are going to save the planet for our children and their children, then we have to get behind this movement. We have to move at speed and at scale to avert the climate and biodiversity collapse which will threaten our very existence as a species.
- We know that Mid Suffolk has a low tree coverage compared to other regions in the UK and MSDC is actively looking to support projects to rectify this situation. So is there more local land that could be used, with community effort, to increase the overall biodiversity of the parish, the district and the county for the benefit of us all?

# THE WALSHAM WILD WOODS

#### POPUP CURRY EVENING

A memorable evening, 70 local people coming together to enjoy each other's company, eat fantastic curries of such variety and flavour that you wouldn't imagine and sitting in the Memorial Village Hall transformed for the evening with trees, lights and total good cheer. A rolling loop of photographs projected onto the wall showing how 'from little acorns mighty oaks do grow' in the way in which the community wild spaces in the parish have developed. The food served and enjoyed, the plates cleared, a brief update on progress with the Jubilee Wood before being introduced to our guest speaker.

As many of you will know, Patrick Barker helps run his family farm over at Westhorpe as well as managing other land in the area. Whilst it is, and has to be, a commercial enterprise they try to work with nature rather than against it. A total of 12% of the land area of the farm is dedicated to environmental and regenerative projects of one sort or another. Hedges, trees of course, thickets and scrub, ponds, wildflower strips and headlands, ponds, water courses and wild areas attract a massive variety of flora and fauna which Patrick is recording as the years go by. In addition to this they have significantly reduced their inputs in terms of pesticides and herbicides and they work with nature to reduce the damage from 'unwanted guests'. Their ploughing regime is much reduced as they drill directly into the stubble of a previous crop and in doing so the health of the soil is improving year on year. The reduction in the use of fossil fuels and nitrates is of course a cost saving to the business and a benefit to us all in terms of climate change, biodiversity and water quality.

Patrick, in his 'spare' time, is a keen ornithologist and we were all intrigued to see and hear about the results of his work with Barn Owls in the area.

A lovely evening, a big thank you to The Steering Group, our guest and those who attended and who made it such a special evening.

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

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# HAVE YOU SEEN THIS INSECT?



The UK is under attack from an invasive insect! The **Asian Hornet** (*Vespa velutina*), also known as the **Yellow-legged Hornet**, is a predatory species of hornet indigenous to Southeast Asia, which arrived accidently in France in 2004. They have since spread throughout Western Europe and have now been found in the UK. They are designated a **Notifiable Invasive Species** and must be reported if seen or captured.

The best way to do this is via the "Asian Hornet Watch App", available free for iPhone and Android. The report will be relayed to a local Asian Hornet Team member (most likely me!) for confirmation. The nest will then be found and destroyed by government officers from APHA.

#### Why should we be concerned?

The Asian Hornet is voracious and will eat nectar, wasps, bees, flies, butterflies, spiders, caterpillars, fallen fruit and carrion. They are such efficient hunters that they will completely suppress all insects within 1km of their nest! Honeybees are a favourite prey and they will devastate an apiary if they find one. Not surprisingly beekeepers are keen to repel these invaders but we should all do our bit to help, because **all our native insects are at risk**.

#### What can we do?

Download the app. Be alert. You may hear one before you see it - its wing buzz is loud and low. Report any sightings.

#### Asian Hornets are black, with yellow legs (socks).

Do not confuse them with native insects, particularly the European Hornet (which is predominately brown and not a problem, despite being bigger and scary-looking!) - See the graphic below.

If we can find them now, we can eliminate them but if we fail they will gain a foothold and then we will never be able to stop them.



of the meeting held on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> February 2024 commencing at 7.00 p.m. in the Memorial Hall.

[Informally approved. Formal approval, at the next meeting with any corrections] **PRESENT:** Cllrs. Bartholomew, Belson, Brookes, Mecrow, Roberts, Tuck, Winch.


- 1. OPENING including Statement, if any
- 2. APOLOGIES
  - County Councillor Jessica Fleming. No consents required.
- 3. DECLARATIONS of Pecuniary & Non-Pecuniary Interests
  - a) Declarations of pecuniary, local non-pecuniary interest(s) incl. personal interests in items on the agenda including any gifts of hospitality None received.
  - b) To receive declarations of lobbying for planning matters on the agenda None received.
- 4. MINUTES To Receive and consider the minutes of the following meetings (as previously circulated)
  - a) Minutes of the meeting of 10<sup>th</sup> January 2024 were approved and signed as a true and accurate record.
  - b) All actions agreed at last meeting were checked and had been completed.
- 5. REPORTS FOR INFORMATION & QUESTIONS to receive written reports
  - a) District Councillor Winch
    - Cllr Belson asked about the proposal for investing some of the reserves in a number of projects to benefit the community and for reassurance that this would not put the council in financial difficulties. Cllr R Winch was able to confirm that the proposed expenditure would in no way threaten the council's financial strength.
  - b) County Councillor Fleming
    - Cllr Belson noted that Cllr Fleming's report referred to work soon to take place on the Stowlangtoft Bridge and that the Parish Council will be invited to attend the working group meetings.
    - Cllr Mecrow noted information from the West Suffolk planning portal re the air quality issues that need to be addressed in Great Barton and the potential impact on traffic though other villages. Clerk to circulate link provided.
    - Cllr J Winch raised the issue of available locality funding from Cllr Fleming's budget for the current financial year. The Clerk was asked to obtain a quote from Westcotec for a new solar powered speed indicator device for Wattisfield Road and submit this to Cllr Fleming.
    - The response from SCC Community Liaison Engineer, Josh White and Cllr Jessica Fleming re the request for Chevron signage on the Summer Road bends near Chapel Road. Cllr Roberts noted has since been observed that there are

many young people visiting this area which was the site of a fatal accident recently, and parking on the verges. The Clerk was asked to write to Highways (copies to Hepworth, Wattisfield and Stanton asking them to support) to request that:

- o temporary warning signage of visiting pedestrians could be erected at this location
- o the 'Slow' signage could be reinstated
- o central road markings are repainted
- o that chevron signage is erected to indicate the sharp bends
- 6. PUBLIC FORUM To receive questions and matters of concern from members of the public in attendance about items on the agenda and Walsham le Willows in general. **Two members of public were present.** 
  - a) A resident of Elm Drive enquired as to what information the Parish Council had about the purpose of drone flying over the site between Elm Drive and Grove Road including the measurement of the streets behind the site. Cllr Belson advised that the Parish Council currently had no information and that any planning application that may arise would be advised to the clerk in first instance and that the Parish Council would then discuss at the following meeting at which residents would be welcome to express their views in the usual way. Immediate neighbours may also be advised directly but this is not a requirement on the planning authority. Cllr Belson was able to advise that the recently adopted neighbourhood plan did not designate any sites for development but that it had been anticipated that this site might be put forward at some point and has addressed how it and similar sites might be developed. Cllr Belson also advised that for any site of more than 5 dwellings, the developer would need to draw up a masterplan before submitted an application.
  - b) A resident wished to draw the attention of the Parish Council to the inappropriate nature of the retrospective planning application DC/24/00519 in a conservation area before this was considered for comment.
  - b) Cllr J. Winch proposed that the March meeting is promoted for focus on the Flood Response and Community Emergency Plan and the April meeting for focus on Traffic Management Proposals and encouraging members of the public to come along to discuss. This was unanimously approved. Clerk to arrange for public notices.

#### 7. FLOOD RESPONSE

- a) Cllr Winch gave an update. Two evidence documents (stream, bridges and 'runoff, ditches, drains and culverts) almost completed and will be presented for
  approval at next meeting with proposal that these are immediately circulated to
  relevant agencies to raise profile ahead of request for this information by SCC. It
  was noted that Walsham le Willows has been prioritised 13 of 48 communities in
  Suffolk identified for flood investigations. It has been advised that in normal
  circumstances 3 such investigations are undertaken and completed annually.
  SCC are diverting resources to try to speed this up following the October
  flooding.
- b) The notification by email about the substance seen floating on surface of the stream outside Millar's Bridge had been followed up and it was ascertained that





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this was sawdust and resin from the felling of a large number of leylandii just a little upstream. It is probably now cleared following rain on 13<sup>th</sup> February.

The Clerk was asked to report again the drain outside Clarkes which although now flowing properly into the stream along the culvert, has sunken further into the road. Already reported by residents (reports 450701 & 452355). Reported again.

Also to report the bad potholes that have opened up again on the Badwell Road at Four Ashes corner. These had already been reported by 2 residents and have been given a 20 day priority for resolution (reports 449941 & 450258). Reported again.

#### 8. COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PLAN (CEP)

Cllrs Brookes and Bartholomew reported that although they are still waiting for the formal guidance that is being updated by SCC, good progress has been made with productive meetings and discussions with SCC Emergency Planning Unit. The draft document prepared by Walsham PC was praised by the officers as a possible model for all CEPs but once SCC have completed their task of preparing a guidance template we will need to retrospectively ensure that our CEP aligns effectively with the SCC plan. In the meantime, the interim report will be presented as a live document, for approval and adoption as a policy statement at the next meeting. Work will continue on next version (volunteers will need to be identified and emergency supplies need to be identified and stored).

#### 9. PLANNING MATTERS

- a) Matters relating to development of the Shepherds Grove site: Nothing other than estate agent seems to be promoting heavily even though the application has not yet been granted.
- b) APPLICATION FOR PLANNING PERMISSION DC/24/00519 Proposal: Householder Application- Erection of new willow screen fencing and wooden pergola over small garden hot tub (retention of) Location: 1 Vine Cottages, The Street, Walsham Le Willows, Bury St Edmunds Suffolk IP31 3AZ PARISH COUNCIL OBJECTS FOR FOLLOWING REASONS:

We would like to lodge our objections to this application in the strongest terms possible. Our main points of objection are:

- 1 The proposal has a significantly detrimental impact on the Walsham le Willows Conservation Area. Objective 1 of the village Neighbourhood Plan is "to ensure that all new development enhances and respects the existing character of the village". This development does neither. It is also in a highly visible position and is clearly seen by both pedestrians and motorists as they pass through the Conservation Area; it is a blemish on a street scene dominated by old cottages and listed buildings.
- 2 The proposal impacts adversely on a Non-designated Heritage Asset. Vine Cottages have been designated as "the remains of a group of buildings once standing around a yard". Their value lies in their attractiveness as a group, but also as an example of a pattern of development found in several places in the village, where a group of 2 or 3 or 4 dwellings were built around three sides of a courtyard with the fourth side opening onto the road. A good example from the village is NDHA 6 Barn Cottage and South Side this shows very clearly how Vine Cottages should appear and the extent to which the proposed development



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- has completely masked an attractive and very interesting facet of the built environment in Walsham.
- 3 The choice of building materials lacks imagination and has resulted in structures which appear temporary and, even after just a few months, shabby. The Design Guidance which forms part of the Neighbourhood Plan states that in assessing the building materials that are proposed we should start with these three questions: what is (are) the distinctive material(s) in the area; does the proposed material harmonise with the local materials; does the proposal use high-quality materials? The proposal clearly fails this test.
- 4 The installation of a hot-tub has resulted in recurring examples of anti-social behaviour. Experience has now shown that the "holiday cottage", "the weekend away" and access to a hot-tub has led to very noisy, boisterous and at times offensive behaviour taking place outside, a few metres from the village street and immediately next to neighbouring properties. Unfortunately, those involved in such behaviour are only resident here for a few days, are unlikely to return to the village, and appear to show little or no respect for the permanent residents.
- 5 The development has resulted in a serious loss of amenity value for people living in this part of the village. Neighbouring properties have found that access to light has diminished, outlook has been severely curtailed, and the noise and disturbance has greatly increased. It is difficult to over-estimate the negative impact that this development has had on this immediate part of the village.

It is very regrettable that this development went ahead without either consultation or the appropriate planning application. Events have however shown quite conclusively that such a development is inappropriate for this location and is highly detrimental to both the built environment and the social environment. We urge that this application be rejected.

c) APPLICATION FOR PRIOR APPROVAL - AGRICULTURAL TO DWELLING - DC/24/00473 Proposal: Notification for Prior Approval for a Proposed Change of Use of Agricultural Building to a Dwelling (Class C3), and for Associated Operational Development under the Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) Order 2015 Schedule 2, Part 3, Class Q - Convert barn to form 1No Dwelling. Location: Cobbold, West Street, Walsham Le Willows, Bury St Edmunds Suffolk IP31 3AP

PARISH COUNCIL IN SUPPORT THE APPLICATION FOR CHANGE OF USE WITH CONDITION THAT A 30MPH LIMIT IS APPLIED TO WEST STREET

The reasons for this condition being sought is that the site does not meet the criteria for connectivity to the main village and in particular for safe use by pedestrians and cyclists. This stretch of road currently has the national speed limit in spite of having a series of sharp bends and no footpaths whilst at the same time the area has growing residential use. There is a history of accidents on this stretch of road including a fatality, vehicle damage and damage to property from vehicles leaving the road. There are regular near misses for vehicles meeting oncoming traffic including HGVs crossing the carriageway and it is currently very unsafe for pedestrians and cyclists due to vehicle speeds. In addition, the pattern of land drainage/run-off is such that it



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

### **GREEN DILEMMAS**

### What's Happening With Recycling?

The proportion of our household waste that goes to recycling grew from 11% in 2001 to 42% in 2022. However, in recent years the level of recycling has stalled and we missed the target of 50% by 2020.

The government has at last clarified its proposals for recycling though most of the implementation won't happen till after the General Election. The overall objective is to standardise recycling across England and to encourage manufacturers to have more sustainable packaging.

Under these plans every local authority in England will collect garden waste, food waste, glass, metal, plastic, paper and card. There also has to be a general waste removal once a fortnight. The dry recycling, including glass, will all use the same recycling bin. The main change for us in Mid Suffolk, is that all food waste can be collected and recycled instead of going to landfill. It should be noted that some local authorities already provide this service.

In Mid Suffolk, the plan is to introduce a weekly food waste collection from April 2026. Households will be provided with food waste containers which will be emptied from your doorstep like the normal bin collection.

At the same time the range of items that you can put in the recycling bin will be increased to include glass bottles and jars, and cartons.


Flexible plastics such as bread bags, plastic films etc will follow a year later. At the moment you need to take plastic film to a supermarket if this is to be recycled.

This will mean that in Mid Suffolk from 2027 most day-to-day items can be recycled via the recycling bin. Larger or specialist items will still need to go to a recycling centre. The same rules are being applied to businesses as well as for schools and hospitals. From 2025 businesses will be obliged to follow the recycling principles and will have their recycling collected in the same way as a household.

In parallel, Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) is being rolled out. This is an environmental policy that requires producers to pay a tax which reflects the full costs of dealing with the waste they produce throughout the lifetime of a product. The annual cost of recycling is about £1.7bn and businesses rather than taxpayers should be picking up this cost. This in turn should result in a reduction in packaging and a move to more sustainable options.

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
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### WILDLIFE IN MARCH

This is the month that Spring is on the way, the Spring Equinox falls on the 20<sup>th</sup> of March. Time to start thinking what jobs need to be done and what plants we are going to put in our gardens. The wildlife is starting to awake from its wintry slumber once again. The birds are feeding and singing more again. We are also entering the breeding season for the birds, and it is not too late to put up some nesting boxes. Most birds will have already been in search of nesting sights since as early as January, but for some birds such as the Blue Tit they will have been searching even earlier than this. Look at what species of birds you have in your garden, you can buy bird boxes specifically for those species of birds or you can buy multi-species bird boxes. You can set up several nesting boxes to increase your chances of someone moving in. The position of the bird box is important, birds like the nesting boxes to be either facing North or North-East, this protects the young from the sun, wind and rain. Allow a clear flight path to and from the nesting box, and help by providing food and water nearby. Birds also like it when they have vegetation or a climbing plant covering the box for extra protection from the elements and predators. You can even get bird boxes that have cameras inside that you can link up either with you phone or your TV. I have just got one and I am hoping to see chicks this year, feathers crossed! You can also help with nesting material, try collecting some moss and leaving it nearby, last year I found that the Blue Tits especially liked collecting my pet rabbit Toby's fur I left out for them.

It is not just the birds that are more active, hiding away in vegetation and leaves you may come across one of our reptiles, the Adder. It is possible to see them about as early as February but March is when they become more active. We have four native species of reptile, the Adder, Slow worm, Common lizard and the Grass snake. All our reptiles are cold blooded so need to bask in the warmth of the sun to increase their body temperature before becoming fully active. If you wish to try and spot one of these reptiles check south facing slopes on warm sunny mornings. Adders are mildly venomous, and are not usually aggressive unless they are provoked. Be careful if you are walking in Adder territory especially if you have a dog, if a dog gets bitten it can have serious health implications. March is also the month you may see in the distance on the fields or running across the road, the Hare. Hare's are nearly twice the size of a wild rabbit, they have longer ears, reddish brown fur and long powerful back legs. These hind legs make the Hare capable of reaching speeds of 45mph, making it possible to outrun most pursuers and they will also run in a zig zag to outwit predators. Hares live a solitary life, living entirely above ground, they sleep and breed in depressions in the ground known as 'forms'. Spring is the main breeding season for them, although they will breed from February to September. The mad March boxing that you will see is either two males known as a 'jack' showing who is more dominant or a male and a female known as a 'jill' showing she is either not ready or testing his determination. The gestation period is between 42-44 days, the young known as 'Leverets' are born fully furred and with their eyes open, they are also born being able to run from predators. Mum will put each baby in its own grassy form and will visit only once each night to allow them to suckle. The Leverets for the rest of the time will lay low and still to avoid detection. Hare's can produce 3-4 litters a year and there will be 2-4 young in each litter.
