




Our cake makers will also be active in May selling cakes at the Sports Club's Funday on Sunday 26th May come along, enjoy the fun and buy some cakes.



We ended last term with five ducklings and it was an amazing experience to see them from hatching to moving on to their new home with one of our pupils. The children were able to monitor how much they grew, how much they ate and see them take their first paddle in a make shift pond. We also visited the church for our end of term Easter Service which was so well attended and it's lovely to see everyone come together at this special time of year. This term will see our very oldest children take their SATs and we are all proud of how hard they are working and the staff supporting them.

The children in Caterpillar class are looking at fairy tales and traditional stories as part of their topic of 'Once Upon a Time' and they will be witnessing seasonal changes as part of their science work. In music they are learning to play glockenspiels and looking at position and direction in maps and using this information to explore maps in geography.

Those in Ladybirds are exploring 'The Enchanted Woodland' and will be focusing on identifying and classifying plants and animals. They are looking at fractions and time and designing fantasy maps in geography.

The children in Dragonflies are looking at 'Heroes and Villains' and will be researching historical heroes and creating comic strips. They will be exploring sound in science and doing athletics in PE.

Grasshoppers will be finding out about 'Chinese Dynasties' and are going to be writing Chinese folk tales. In science they are learning about living things and their habitats and will be trying Chinese foods as part of their DT cookery lesson.



CITIZENS ADVICE



I recently started a new job where my boss has told me I'll have to work on bank holidays. This was never the case in my old job. Can my employer really make me work on a public holiday, and should I get paid extra if I do?

Unfortunately, when it comes to bank holidays, whether staff have to work is up to their employer, and you don't have to be paid more if you do. The situation will vary from job to job and may depend on several factors such as whether your place of work is open on bank holidays, your hours of work and crucially, what your contract says.

Look at your contract, if you have one, to find out what your personal situation is. Your contract might say you will always get bank holidays off, but it might say you may sometimes be required to work them or will always be required to work. But if your contract says you get bank holidays off you shouldn't be asked to work.

Your contract might say something like: "In addition to bank and public holidays, your annual entitlement to holidays is X days". This means you get public holidays off in addition to your annual leave entitlement, but it might not mean you're entitled to take the specific days off. You may be required to work a bank holiday, in which case you should get another day off instead.

Alternatively, it might say something like: "Your annual holiday entitlement (inclusive of bank and public holidays) is X days" - this means you have to take bank holidays off as part of your annual leave entitlement. Bank holidays will either be deducted from your annual leave allowance (so you'll have to book all bank holidays as paid time off) or counted as additional holiday days.

A common misunderstanding around bank holidays is that employers have to pay you extra for working them. This is not the case. Unless your contract says you'll be paid extra you will just be paid your normal amount. If your contract says you are entitled to bank holidays but you're asked to work, you should be able to take a different day off in lieu. Your employer must follow what's set out in your contract. If they don't, you should raise this with them.

If you don't have a contract, the legal default position is that your employer can tell you when you can or can't take time off. If you'd like to request a bank holiday off, use the normal method for requesting time off.

If you find you need to resolve an issue with your employer, first ask for an informal chat, where you can raise your concerns. If this doesn't get you anywhere, you may need to raise a formal grievance. If you need advice on this, contact Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk.

PLEASE HELP THE HOGGIES



Anyone who knows me will know that I am passionate about hedgehogs. We have three hedgehog highways in our garden fence and get nightly visits from our spikey friends when they come to café hog for their dinner. I also collect hedgehogs from local rescue centres and release them in our garden where they wander off via the hedgehog highways to begin their adventures. These hedgehog highways (4" holes at the bottom of our fence) are important for 'hoggies' as they allow them to wander from garden-togarden foraging for much needed food. The biggest cause of their demise is starvation and contrary to belief hedgehogs do not eat slugs and snails but they do eat centipedes and bugs which they will forage from your garden.

Every evening, I feed my spikey visitors tinned dog food (in jelly not gravy) and I mix it with Brambles hedgehog biscuit which I buy from Mole country store. Not all hedgehog biscuit is of good quality so anyone feeding hedgehogs should source a good quality recommend brand such as Brambles. It is important to always put out water in a shallow bowl.

With this in mind I am asking that everyone reading this post will please sign and share this parliament petition (link below) To make hedgehog surveys & mitigation measures compulsory for all new developments. Hedgehogs are in decline and without our help they will cease to exist. Please do not let this happen. We are a long way from the target number of 100.000 signatures needed to get this petition considered for debate in parliament (currently we are over 8000) if every one of us sign and share then we can reach the target and make a difference. Sharing on social media will give a significant boost!



EASTER EGG HUNTING IN THE WILD WOODS



COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY

Income and Expenditure Report 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2024

Over the period 2021/22 to 2023/24 the Parish Council has received Neighbourhood CIL grants from MSDC totalling £84,507.41.

CIL is generated by a levy on the developers of new housing to fund improvements to the infrastructure alongside the increased housing. Neighbourhood CIL is paid to parish councils at a rate of 15% of the available total collected from developers where there is no adopted Neighbourhood Plan. As we now have and adopted Neighbourhood Plan any future development will generate grants at a rate of 25% for the Parish Council.

GREEN DILEMMAS

The Future for Water Companies

Water companies have come under huge amounts of scrutiny recently because of the amount of sewage that is being pumped into our rivers and seas. The latest figures suggest 3.6 million hours of sewage discharges last year even though this is only meant to happen in exceptional circumstances. According to the Rivers Trust, in 2023, the sewer storm overflow at Walsham le Willows spilled 25 times for a total of 118.50 hours and the sewer storm overflow at Badwell Ash spilled 79 times for a total of 1,107.72 hours.

These issues have triggered a debate about the role of water companies. These companies are private monopolies and since privatisation over £70 billion has been paid in dividends to shareholders most of whom are foreign private investment companies or foreign pensions funds. Water companies have also racked up huge debts amounting to over £50 billion - about £2000 per household.

The question is what should be done going forward? Here are some of the main options that you see discussed with some pluses and minuses.

Carry on with the current model. This would mean keeping the privatised water industry but with greatly increased charges to customers in order to pay for the required infrastructure upgrades. This is what the industry is currently lobbying for. Opinion polls suggest that most people don't want to pay higher prices for a monopoly service that hasn't delivered.

Full public ownership by buying out shareholders. The main logic here is that there isn't any competition anyway and it would be better if all extra profits went into upgrading the infrastructure. This option would probably have a lot of popular support. However, the cost of buying out the shareholders at current market valuation and paying off the water companies' debts is something most governments wouldn't want to contemplate given the pressure on public finances.

Force water companies to honour their legal commitments or rue the consequences. The end logic here is that you would in effect prevent the payment of dividends if companies were in breach of their obligations. The problem with this option is that water companies wouldn't be able to attract any additional financial investment. For example, Thames Water has £18m of debt and urgently needs more investment as it can't even meet its own interest payments. The argument is that if the government allows Thames Water to go bust and default on all its loans it would inevitably dent confidence in investing in UK PLC.

Acquire shares in water companies as part of an agreed process. This option would require the companies to transfer a significant element of share ownership as part of any deal around investment, pricing and meeting legal commitments. It would combine an element of public ownership with private investment. The reality is that this would be difficult to get agreed.

If this all sounds like we are being held to ransom by the water industry investors this is pretty much the case. Privatising a natural monopoly that sells a product that the customer has to use was a pretty stupid decision and getting out of the mess won't be easy.


WILDLIFE IN MAY

Life is now in abundance in our gardens and when walking about, waking up from those colder dark months, warming themselves in the sunshine and busily preparing to breed the next generation. You may remember back in the March edition that I wrote I had a camera bird nestbox, I am pleased to say we have had a guest check in, it is a Blue Tit. It is mostly the female that builds the nest with no or very little help from the male. It took her around just over a week to complete the nest, gathering materials from the garden, using hanging basket inserts, mosses and feathers. Most of the feathers that were gathered came from a Dove that had been hunted by a bird of prey in our garden. She also made little peak marks around the entrance hole, this is not to try to make the entrance bigger but to tell other birds this box is taken! Males will stay close by to defend the territory but mostly to keep an eye on the female to make sure she does not mate with any other males. Although she had marked that this bird box was taken we did have another Blue Tit come and have a look which our bird was not best pleased about and hissed at the intruder until they went away. Blue Tits will on average lay around 8-12 eggs, but it can be as many up to 16, they are a glossy white with brown speckles. We have at the moment 6 eggs in the nest box, and she should lay one a day mostly in the morning until her clutch is complete. She will not start to incubate them until all the clutch is laid, until then the embryos will lay dormant. Once she begins to incubate the eggs they will take around 2 weeks to hatch, so hopefully I will have an update in the next edition. Feathers crossed!

Lots of bugs are becoming more visible to us and an invertebrate that may remind you of your childhood chasing these flying beasts around is the Cockchafer. Also known as a May Bug, Doodlebug, Chovy or a Billy Witch! They are large beetles which have brown wing cases and legs, they also have antennae that are shaped into a fan. You will see them mostly in the evening after the sun has set, and will find them around streetlamps or banging into a lit-up window. As larvae they spend their time underground for around 3-5 years, they can be a pest in large numbers as they will eat grass and vegetable roots. After emerging as adults they will only live for 6 weeks, in this time they eat leaves and flowers, and are in search for a mate before time runs out. When they have found a mate the female will lay the eggs in the soil, once hatched they burrow into the soil and the lifecycle will start once again.

Be sure to look in and around your ponds this month as it will be full of life with Dragonflies, Water Beetles and the children's favourite the Tadpoles.



Since much of the 'rubbish' must have been transported by some motor vehicle it raises the question as to why the person could not have driven to the wonderful Recycling Centre outside Bury St Edmunds.

First of all, book a time slot by typing **Bury St Edmunds Recycling** into your browser and click on the link. You will then be asked for your name, car registration and time that you would like, as well as one or two questions to make sure that you are not going to deposit quantities of trade waste. It's as simple as that!

Once there it's quite simple to find the right container to put your 'rubbish', including a **Re-use container** for items which may have not actually come to the end of their useful life.

In partnership with Suffolk County Council and FCC Environment a Re-use shop is based at Centre All items are checked and tested by the shop staff and only suitable items are sold in there. There's a wide range of items for sale, including: Electrical items, Furniture, Children's Toys, Prams/highchairs and other baby and toddler items, Sports Equipment, CD's, DVD's and books, Bicycles, DIY and garden tools. (No appointment is required to visit the Re-use Shop). They take in donated items and the profits made by selling them help the Benjamin Foundation to fund their work for children, families and adults who need our help.

"Whilst there you can make a donation to the Benjamin Foundation whose aim is to provide high quality services and opportunities that significantly improve the lives of vulnerable children and young people. We provide advice, support, counselling, information, supported accommodation, positive activities, parenting support, out of school and youth projects and re-use schemes."

So, there you are! Get rid of your 'rubbish'! Find a bargain! Feel virtuous! And if you should feel the need for sustenance, before returning home, go to the nearby Folk café. The icing on the cake is that there are no parking charges at either location!

Jesus Dies & Jesus Lives.

At the time of writing, Easter week is still a few days away and by the time this new edition of Walsham Observer lands upon the doormat it will all be behind us for another year. Standing upon the threshold of April, the happily spent bank holidays will soon be forgotten, the chocolate will be eaten, the flowers given to loved ones beginning to fade; but what of the timeless, eternal truth of Easter? Will it too be forgotten? Or, more to the point, has it really been considered in the first place?

This is the season of the year that Christians tend to particularly remember the death, burial, and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ, as these events are truly central to the Christian Faith, world history, and the eternal future of every human soul.

That the Lord Jesus Christ died upon a Roman cross at Calvery is a well-established historical fact, but his death was not unique in this, as countless thousands have died over the years by crucifixion. Death, in some form, is of course the expected end of all that are ever born, "For as in Adam all die" (1 Corinthians 15:22). The death of Jesus Christ was however no ordinary death. It was not the death of one who died as a martyr for a worthy cause; it was not of one who died to give us a supreme example of self-sacrifice and self-denial. He did not die to publicise some great injustice or promote a political ideology; he certainly did not die, as some have done, to gain notoriety and a place in the history books or on social media.

Jesus' death was unique in that he was the only person that has ever lived that did not actually deserve to die. The Bible clearly teaches that, "All have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23) and, "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). As we have recently considered at Christmas, "God was manifest in the flesh" (1 Timothy 3:16), meaning that Jesus is God and therefore, "Is holy, harmless, undefiled, separate from sinners" (Hebrews 7:26). Jesus therefore being perfect was unworthy of death, so it was not for the punishment of his own sin that he died, but he died in the place of all of his people, who through all ages would love, trust, and follow him as their Lord and Saviour.

Jesus said, "I lay down my life, that I might take it again" (John 10:17) so he is also unique in that death and the grave could not hold him. "He rose again the third day according to the scriptures" (Acts 27:14) "After that, he was seen of over 500 brethren at once" (1 Corinthians 15:6). This then is another historic fact, even testified of by the elite Roman soldiers who were set to guard the tomb, so indisputable was the testimony that the chief priests, "When they were assembled with the elders, and had taken counsel, they gave large money to the soldiers" (Matthew 28:12) in order that they should lie and deny the wonders they had seen.

At that first Easter, Pontius Pilate asked a pertinent question, "What shall I do then with Jesus which is called Christ? (Matthew 27:22). We must love and trust him with our whole heart as he alone, "Hast the words of eternal life" (John 6:68) "I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die. Believest thou this?" (John 11:25-26)


